
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

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Cancer victim starts hotline for patients

image most people associate with cancer is "death," but the organizer of a cancer patient outreach program is hoping to change that thought to "dial."

Larry Moore, himself a can-cer patient, began organizing the Cancer Hotline of Tarrant County Inc. last July. In January, it became the fifth operating cancer hotline in the

The need, says Moore, is im-

"In Tarrant County alone, an average of nine new cancer patients are diagnosed every day," he said. "If we can make half of those aware we exist, that will be

By dialing 817-535-0756, cancer patients or their family members are placed in contact with a volunteer who has successfully coped with a similar cancer and who provides a listening resource, a morale boost and an abundance of facts.
"I have not talked to any

cer patients who were not enthusiastic," Moore said. "Our first call was from California, from a lung cancer patient.

before beginning work on the Tarrant County program and Bloch, who founded the Kansas City program after recovering from what had been diagnosed as terminal lung cancer, recently addressed volunteers in Fort

The goal of the Tarrant County program, and similar projects in Little Rock, Ark. Memphis, Tenn., and Gainesville, Fla., is to help people cope with the sudden, shattering emotional and mental realities of a cancer diagnosis.
