## Braniff price-gouging, airport official claims

FORT WORTH — A DallasFort Worth Regional Airport
official testified Braniff International is subleasing its terminal at overpriced rates and has allowed the facilities to become

severely damaged.

The D-FW Airport Board filed suit in federal bankruptcy court claiming Braniff has not made full payments for the faci-

lities. The airport board also said Braniff is in violation of its contract by subleasing its facilities to other airlines

Braniff officials, however, claim the airline must hold the facilities as assets in order to resume operations in the future.
