Boston Herald American reporter Paul Corsetti was ordered Monday by Norfolk Superior Court Judge Robert A. Barton to immediately begin serving a 90-day contempt sentence at the Middlesex House of Correction in Billerica.

But his attorney, Thomas C. Troy, appealed to the Mas-sachusetts Supreme Court and was given a 24-hour stay to seek a federal court appeal.

The pardons panel recom-mended Gov. Edward J. King deny Corsetti's plea for a pardon. Corsetti argued he was within in his First Amendment rights and disclosure of the in-formation would have an adverse effect on the free flow of information.

Corsetti refused to testify in court about interviews he had with Edward R. Kopacz Jr., who allegedly confessed to him he shot and killed gay hustler Cur-tis Dale Barbre in Lowell in February 1978.

Kopacz was later acquitted by a jury.
