WASHINGTON — Balancing the federal budget is not a realistic possibility in the next three years, the Congressional Budget Office says, predicting deficits averaging \$155 billion unless Congress acts quickly. More taxes will have to be imposed and further cuts, including some in defense and Social Security, will have to be made to lower the deficit, the

budget office said. In its mid-year economic and budget review, the CBO predicted the deficit will climb from \$112 billion in fiscal 1982 to \$155 billion next year, even if Congress enacts the remaining spending cuts called for in the 1983 budget resolution. Congress already has made \$30 billion in spending cuts and has hiked taxes \$98.3 billion. Federal deficits are projected

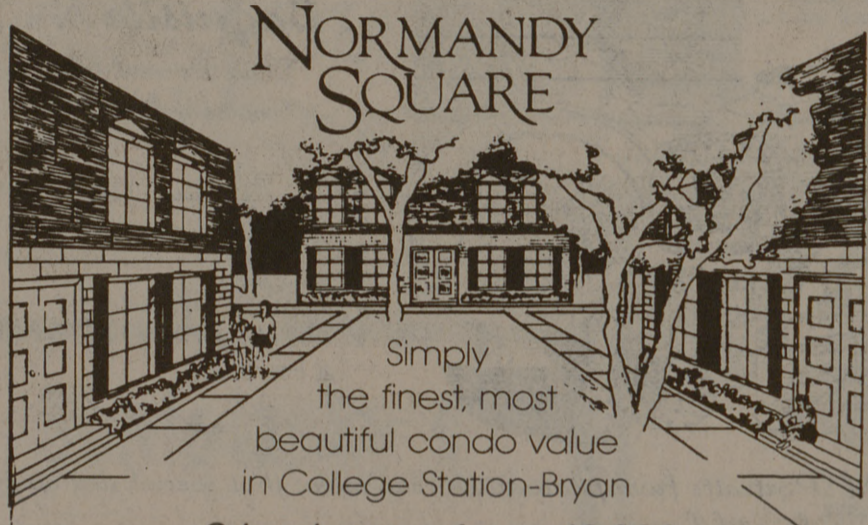
by the CBO to remain in the \$150 billion to \$160 billion range through 1985. "With projected deficits of approximately \$155 billion, balancing the budget in the next few years is not a realistic objective," the CBO concluded. The Reagan administration has estimated the fiscal 1983 budget deficit at \$115 billion and said deficits would be lower in 1984 and 1985.

In California, where President Reagan is vacationing, deputy press secretary Larry Speakes indicated the administration does not agree with the CBO estimates. The CBO said the main reasons for its higher deficit estimates are lower inflation and lower levels of real gross national product, both of which significantly reduce the amount of tax revenue the government re-

ceives to pay its bills. Although the CBO's economic recovery is large federal deficits and monetary policy could be interest rates high and balanced budget unlikely. The 1982 deficit of \$115 billion was double the deficit recorded in 1980 and 1981, four times as large as the deficit.

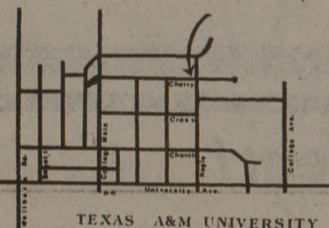

**Polish disturbances continue**

WARSAW, Poland — Crowded Polish riot police in Czeszochowa and Lubin Wednesday in a second day of disturbances apparently triggered by the shooting deaths of two demonstrators, the official news agency PAP reported today. Other reports said the riots in Lubin were continuing today, but they could not immediately be confirmed.

With telephone links between Polish cities severed, the PAP report was the first news of renewed disturbances after riot police clashed with thousands of protesters in more than 12 cities to break up demonstrations marking Solidarity's second anniversary. More than 4,000 people were arrested and three people were killed during the clashes Tuesday — the most serious chal-

lenge to Poland's military rulers since martial law was imposed Dec. 13. PAP said crowds in Lubin set fire to a reading room in the city hall and hurled Molotov cocktails and stones at firemen Wednesday after marching through the city to the local Communist Party headquarters. In an indication the rioting was widespread, the news agency said protesters built barri-

ades in many parts of the country where riot police opened fire on demonstrators Tuesday, wounding two people. "Due to determination of the order-keeping forces peace was restored in Lubin," PAP also reported Wednesday in Czeszochowa, the site of Poland's national shrine, but it gave no de-

**Thatcher blasts pipeline policy**

GLASGOW, Scotland — Prime Minister Margaret Thatcher rebuked President Reagan for threatening sanctions against firms selling pipeline equipment to the Soviet Union, and said Britain would honor its deals with Moscow. Hours after Thatcher chast-

tised Reagan Wednesday for his pipeline ban, U.S. officials announced sanctions against Britain's John Brown Engineering would be less severe than those imposed earlier against two French firms. Sanctions against all three firms now will be limited to oil and gas-related products, U.S. officials said. The embargo was

imposed to protest martial law in Poland. In a tough speech Wednesday in Glasgow — marred by demonstrators and an attempt to rush the prime minister — Thatcher strongly criticized the American sanctions. She implied the United States had a double standard that allowed it to continue selling

grain to the Soviets while keeping its European allies from selling the Soviets gas pipes. In Nantes, France, Creusot-Loire announced they would produce twelve gas filters for the pipeline to the Soviet Union around Monday.

**Israel 'totally rejects' Reagan peace proposals**

JERUSALEM — Israel Wednesday rejected President Reagan's new peace initiative to create a Palestinian homeland linked to Jordan, Deputy Prime Minister David Levy said. Levy said the government was not seeking a confrontation with Washington, but would stand firm on its own interpreta-

tion of the Camp David accords. "The government completely rejects the proposals because they will lead to the establishment of a Palestinian state if this is not intended," Levy said. "The proposals deviate from the Camp David accords — a charter by the United States
