# Rhodes applications being taken

Applications for the prestigious Rhodes scholarships are being taken through Sept. 15 for interested students.

To qualify for the scholarship, a student must be an unmarried, graduating senior with a GPA of 3.75. He or she must

also be a U.S. citizen and be between 18 and 24 years of age as of Oct. 1, 1982.

Dr. John Reading, coordinator of Texas A&M applicants, said quality of character and intellect are the most important qualifications. Though many Rhodes scholars have been athletes, a "continuing physical

vigor ... is more important than athletic prowess," the Rhodes Scholarship application form says.

Reading said Rhodes scholars receive money for room, board and tuition at the University of Oxford in England. Three Texas A&M students have been awarded Rhodes scholarships in

the past five years. Reading said that only about 15 students apply for the scholarships at Texas A&M each year. He encourages more to apply.

# New computing center eases access problems

The new Academic Computer Center located in the Academic and Agency Building may help alleviate student's problems with finding computer space.

Dr. John Dinkel, head of the Department of Business Analysis and Research, said although the new computer center won't completely solve the problem of overcrowding, it has taken a tremendous load off the Remote Computer Center and students should find it easier to have access to a terminal.

The ACC was opened in Feb-

rurary with 48 terminals, one word processor, one card reader and eight key punch machines.

It was completed in August with the addition of a Prime 750 computer with 80 terminals and 45 micro-computers. These additional computers will be used by students in the College of Business Administration.

Dinkel said the ACC served approximately 5,000 students last semester. He also said the center can accommodate the 6,000 students enrolled in business analysis related courses.

Hours for the ACC are: Monday through Thursday: 8 a.m. to

midnight, Friday and Saturday: 8 a.m. to 5 p.m., and Sunday noon to midnight.

Happy hours run Monday to Thursday 5 p.m. to 8 a.m. and all day Sunday.

Unlike other computer centers on campus, the ACC is run by Texas A&M University. The other centers are run directly by the Data Processing Center. Because the ACC is owned by the University, it is able to set its own rates for the Prime 750 computer which Dinkel said will probably be lower than the DPCs. The 48 Wylbur terminals which tie into the DPC will have the same standard rates.
