"It's better than the 70 to 1 exchange rate they have in Juarez. I kind of think of it as a community service," he said with a slight smile.

Perhaps it could be the long lines at the banks that encourage people to go to money ex-changers, said Irving Rubin, manager of Star Jewelry, who also deals in money exchanging.

Rubin estimated the money exchange business at his store has increased about 50 percent since Mexico nationalized its banks.

He said his exchange can often alter its exchange rate depending on the amount of money involved.

"Sometimes a give a better exchange rate if there is a higher amount of money to exchange. I don't know if the banks can do that," he said.
