Offshore drilling said safe

NORFOLK, Va. — Oil company representatives told a public hearing that offshore drilling is efficient and environmentally safe because of technological advancements.

Carl Wickizer, engineering manager of the Shell Oil Co.'s offshore division, said Wednesday that while he understood environmental concerns, offshore drillers have a good record of protecting the land.

"Certainly, people think of Santa Barbara," he said, referring to the 1969 oil spill into the Santa Barbara Channel from an offshore rig. "But we have a proven safety record. Most of the accidents since then have been from (oil) tankers."

David King, vice president of operations for Zapata Offshore, an oil rig manufacturer, said accidents like February's sinking of the oil rig Ocean Ranger off the Canadian coast are rare.

"However, when an accident does occur in the industry, such as the Ocean Ranger, it can be spectacular," he said. "The Ocean Ranger accident is not a good reason to restrict or prohibit offshore drilling. Very responsive actions have been and will continue to be taken to prevent accidents of this nature from recurring."

Claude Golay, manager for environmental and regulatory matters for Chevron USA, said offshore drilling is needed because oil supplies in American fields almost will be depleted by the year 2000 and oil imports can be threatened by political turmoil.

"These next 25 to 30 years will be a transitional period," he said. "But the gap between now until then must be bridged with new discoveries of domestic oil and gas. Where will we find these major new U.S. oil fields? At least 25 to 40 percent will be offshore."
