Dean said he cannot give offication to local party officals of vacancies that have e receives a formal advisory pionion from White's office at the high court's ruling transfer winter believes he cannot issue advisory opinions on matters still before the courts.

He said about 65 offices will be affected and challenged White to exert "legal leadership"

rather than ignore the issue.
"I suppose he's made some sort of political decision that if he rules on it, it might adversely affect his campaign," he said. "This is not a political issue."

Dean said without official word from White, the offices will have to be filled by appointment instead of election. Dean said local parties are facing a Sept. 24 deadline in substituting names on the official ballots. A spokesman for White's
