Aggies 'strikeout' UTA to sweep double-header

When the Texas Aggies arrived in Arlington to play a double-header against the University of Texas at Arlington, everyone who should have been there was there.
Everyone, that is, except the umpire. He showed up an hour late, but you really can't blame him. No doubt he was just resting his voice.
The Aggies, you see, are tough on

umpires. When you call a game featuring pitchers like Lori Stoll and Shan McDonald, you have to be prepared to call strikes. And you have to call them all night long.
The Aggies' pitching staff of Stoll and McDonald combined for 30 strikeouts in 15 innings of play Tuesday night as Texas A&M defeated UT-A 2-1 and 8-0.
Nineteen of those strikeouts came from the pitching arm of McDonald, who set a team record for number of strike-

outs in a single game.
Stoll threw 11 strikeouts in the first game, giving up four hits and walking one to run her record to 10-0.
The Aggies scored first in the second inning when Josie Carter walked to lead off. She was sacrificed to second, and went to third on a Debbie Rollman single. Carter scored when Mary Schwind singled.
After UT-A tied the game in the fourth, the Aggies had to wait until the

eighth inning to get the win. Cindy Foster singled and stole second. Cindy Cooper then bunted, and Foster moved to third on the throw to first. The next batter, Carrie Austgen, laid down a suicide squeeze bunt, scoring Foster for the 2-1 win.
The second game was all McDonald. She gave up only one hit, and only two putouts were made by the Aggies' fielders. Offensively, Texas A&M had 11 hits.

Pittsburgh, Nebraska head UPI rankings following big victories

NEW YORK — The University of Pittsburgh retained its No. 1 college football ranking in yesterday's balloting by UPI's Board of Coaches while Nebraska inched ahead of Washington into the No. 2 position and moved within two points of the Panthers.
Pittsburgh, which improved to 2-0 with a 37-17 victory at Florida State in a driving rainstorm, received 17 first-place votes and 567 points from the 42 coaches — six from each of seven geographical sections of the country — who comprise the board. The Cornhuskers, who set numerous NCAA offensive records in overwhelming New Mexico State 68-0, collected eight first-place votes and 565 points.
"I'm quite pleased with our game against Florida State," said Pittsburgh coach "Fog" Fazio. "It's very difficult to play there and we're kind of banged up. We haven't put everything all together yet, but I think that will happen soon. Our defense had some problems while the offense came through."
Clemson, rated 13th last week, settled for a 17-17 tie with Boston College, 1-0-1, the night Saturday and fell out of the Top 20 as did Michigan, which was ranked ninth last week.
Illinois and Boston College appear in the Top 20 for the first time this year.
