NEW YORK — The University of Pitt-burgh retained its No. 1 college football ating in yesterday's balloting by UPI's

Pittsburgh, which improved to 2-0 with a Toledo. 37-17 victory at Florida State in a driving ainstorm, received 17 firstplace votes and bama: N 67 points from the 42 coaches — six from ach of seven geographical sections of the ountry — who comprise the board. The ornhuskers, who set numerous NCAA ffensive records in overwhelming New lexico State 68-0, collected eight first-place otes and 565 points.

"I'm quite pleased with our game against brida State," said Pittsburgh coach "Foge" fazio. "It's very difficult to play there and we're kind of banged up. We haven't put verything all together yet, but I think that will happen soon. Our defense had some problems while the offense came through." Clemson, rated 13th last week, settled for 17-17 tie with Boston College, 1-0-1, turday and fell out of the Top 20 as did Michigan, which was ranked ninth last
