10 indicted on charges of running 'slave ring'

United Press International LOS ANGELES — Seven of 10 people accused of running an international slave ring that sold Indonesians to wealthy homeowners looking for cheap domestic servants were out on

bail Saturday.

U.S. Magistrate James
McMahon set bail Friday at
\$250,000 for Nasim Mussry of Beverly Hills, and ordered him to surrender his passport. Bail for Moses Aslan of Los Angeles was placed at \$100,000. Five other suspects in the servant scheme were ordered to post \$10,000 bail. All seven posted

the bail and were released. Three of the suspects named in a 52-count federal grand jury in court. Two of them were being held in Jakarta, Indone-sia, the FBI said, and the other was expected to surrender soon.

The indictment was unsealed Thursday after a 16-month investigation into allegations that 50 Indonesians, ranging in age from 18 to 40, were recruited in that country to work in the United States for two to three years with the promise of a beginning salary of \$100 a month.

They reportedly were given passports, visas, round-trip airline tickets and sometimes money to show immigration officials. But when they arrived in Los Angeles their documents were said to have been taken away to keep them from leaving.
