United Press International How can you determine if might be a candidate for at le one type of heart disorde Take a good close look at you earlobes. Recent surveys have revealed

that people under 60 years wi a clear diagonal crease in one both ear lobes may be more li ly than most to suffer from coronary artery disease, an iness in which arteries serving the heart become clogged with cholesterol and other fats. Andre Pasternac and Magdi Sami, two Canadian cardiolog

ists who investigated the pro-pective link, believe that the crease could identify peop who are aging prematurely a thus are at higher risk of corol ary artery disease than the gen eral population.
The earlobe, they explain contains a large number of elatic fibers that with age growles resilient, leading to creases. the same fashion, increased su

ceptibility to heart disease has
