CIA agent's trials set

WASHINGTON — A federal judge ordered two separate trial dates for globetrotting ex-CIA agent Edwin Wilson on charges of selling arms to Libya and agreeing to set up the murder of an Egyptian opponent of Libyan strongman Moammar Khadafy.

U.S. District Court Judge John Pratt Monday set a trial date of Nov. 22 for Wilson on charges of illegally exporting explosives and bomb materials to Libya, along with the experienced personnel to explain how to use them.

The trial date for the assassination conspiracy has not been set yet. The murder never took place, although Wilson has been said to have received a \$1 million contract to organize the killing.

Wilson, whose wealth was estimated by the government at \$14.1 million, is being held in lieu of \$60 million bail — the total set for a series of indictments. He also faces two other trials in Houston and Alexandria, Va., on related charges of helping Khadafy in his worldwide terrorism campaign.

Further, a grand jury in Denver is investigating his activities there.

Pratt spent the day hearing attorneys for Wilson and the government argue over the legality of a scheme to lure the 20-year veteran of the CIA back into the country so he could be arrested.

Defense attorney Herald Price Fahringer told the judge

the government had violated his client's rights by making Wilson think he was being offered a big money deal worth leaving his Libyan sanctuary for last June.

Prosecutors insisted there was nothing illegal about the plan. Pratt apparently agreed and rejected the defense argument.

The judge also ordered both sides to file briefs within a week on a defense motion to move the

trials from Washington.

Wilson was not in the courtroom late in the afternoon when the judge set the trial date. He has been held at an undisclosed location in the Washington area. Marshals refused to discuss whether he would be returned to New York, where he was held before the hearing, or kept in Washington until the trial.

Mexican oil boom to slow

NEW YORK — Budget cutbacks caused by Mexico's financial crisis will slow the nation's oil production boom in the next few years, Petroleum Intelligence Weekly reported.

"Contrary to speculation in some quarters, Mexico doesn't have the productive capacity to flood the world oil market with additional crude oil as a way of

pulling out of its straits," a survey of Mexico's oil journal said.

Mexico now is producing crude oil at full capacity, million barrels a day and an average 2.7 million barrels for 1982. Mexico's oil export, 1.65 million barrels a day, but the average for a year should be about 1.1 million barrels daily, PIM said.

Test-tube baby center to open

KANSAS CITY, Kan. — The chairman of obstetrics and gynecology at the University of Kansas Medical Center says the school's test tube reproduction unit will go on line in January despite objections some people might have.

Although he expects criticism to develop over the proposed "in vitro fertilization" center, Dr. Kermit Krantz says he is not sympathetic to arguments some people have against the reproductive method first carried out successfully in 1978.

"It is extremely important that we deliver health care here without being affected by any bias," he said Monday. "We are representing the state of Kansas, a free society, and in it we must do that which is morally and ethically sound in the practice of medicine."

"I'm not in the business of considering each individual's morals. I'm in the business of good medicine, which transcends what some person or another thinks."

Krantz said the medical cen-

ter's test tube reproduction program would be only the seventh of its kind known to exist in the United States.

Leaders of Right to Life groups in Kansas and Missouri said they would look into the program more thoroughly before judging it. But Rosemary Maher, president of Right to Life of Eastern Kansas, said many members are concerned over the morality, and some of the methods used, in reproducing life in a laboratory.

Maher said Right to Life objected to test tube centers that required abortion if the baby would be born handicapped or abnormal. KU officials said that would not be done. Some people also are concerned that some fertilized eggs might be discarded instead of returned to the mother's womb, she said.

"I also feel there is such an irony here that when KU is known throughout the Midwest as an abortion center, in the same center they would be spending time and money on the test tube unit," she said. "That's almost hypocritical."

Now you know

Roofs and ledges of urban skyscrapers may provide new homes for the endangered peregrine falcon, usually at home on mountain peaks.

Concerned that poachers, predators and pesticides have trimmed the world's peregrine population, conservationists have begun breeding the birds in captivity. Once raised however, they would face the same dangers in their native habitats.

The answer: McGill University ornithologist David Bird has released 30 falcons around Mon-

tréal and found the urban area hospitable because of the birds' willingness to nest atop buildings. The city skyline bears a striking resemblance to the mountains. Further, the sparrows, pigeons and seagulls indigenous to the city serve as ready prey.

But the city poses dangers not found in the wild. Occasionally the birds are killed when they collide with mirrored buildings, apparently mistaking their own reflections for a potential meal or foe.
