

Battalion Reporter Students taking meat laboratory courses will soon be treated to a change from the 50year-old Animal Industries Building. Conditions should be less cramped in a few months, after completion of the new meat science

The building, located on west campus next to the Kleberg Animal and Food Science Center, will rank among the best meat science facilities in the nation, Ray Riley, manager of the meat laboratory,

The building will be for re-tail sales and a modernized training program for stu-

However, the new meat science and technology center won't be ready for business until the start of next year, said Dr. Jeff Savell, an assistant professor associated with the construction and design of
