

# Reagan group to visit South America

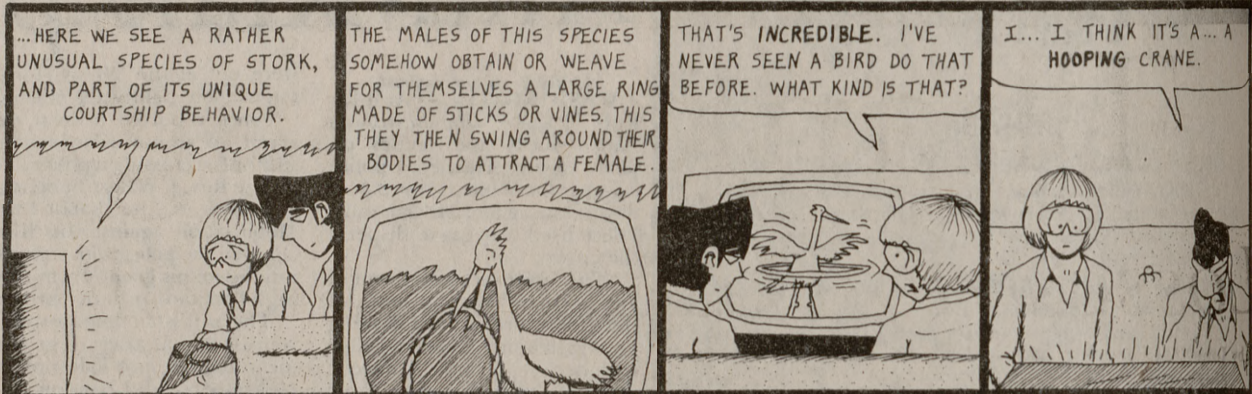

WASHINGTON—President Reagan will visit Brazil, Colombia, Costa Rica, and Honduras this week on a five-day

goodwill mission intended to promote U.S. ties, administration officials say.  
Reagan will meet with leaders of the four Latin American na-

tions, and hold separate meetings with President Jose Efraim Rios Montt of Guatemala in Honduras and President Alvaro Magana of El Salvador in Costa Rica.

He is scheduled to return from a California vacation today, then leave for Brazil Tuesday.

Reagan decided in October to accompany Secretary of State George Schultz on the trip.

# Part of Hawaii made major disaster area

HONOLULU—The path of Hurricane Iwa through Hawaii was declared major disaster area by President Reagan Saturday, clearing the way for federal agencies to help residents of Kauai, Niihau and Oahu repair thousands of home and businesses.

The presidential action — at the request of Hawaii Gov. George Ariyoshi — came as the first detailed list of damages was released for Oahu Island, including Honolulu. The preliminary combined total for Kauai and Oahu losses stood at \$143 million, including crop damage figures from Oahu.

Little information has been available on privately-owned Niihau, but the Red Cross esti-

mates included 20 homes destroyed and 160 damaged on that island, indicating almost all 226 residents were severely affected.

Much of Kauai and half of Oahu still was without power Saturday. The Navy submarine Indianapolis stood by off Kauai's Nawiliwili Harbor in case it was needed to provide emergency power to get other sources going. Three Navy generators flown to Honolulu were being taken to Kauai by barge.

On Oahu, the Hawaii Army National Guard and the 25th Infantry Division were out Saturday setting up generators and water tanks in various locations. It was expected to be two to three weeks before regular power could be restored to some areas. Telephone service to

Kauai remained minimal.

The Red Cross issued another urgent appeal Saturday for volunteers and money for supplies, but said food and clothing were not needed.

Spokeswoman Jeanne Pa said of some 6,000 people sheltered on Kauai the night of the hurricane, all but 20 had been absorbed by the community Friday night.

The White House Presidential quarters in Santa Barbara said the President's disaster relief fund could be used for individual and family grants, unemployment assistance, temporary housing assistance for eight disaster victims, and the repair or replacement of damaged or destroyed public facilities.

Despite the extensive property damage, only one life was lost to Hurricane Iwa. There were 700 injuries according to the Red Cross, but none of the major. The fatality was a Seaman Jose Conituk, whose ship was struck by a monstrous wave just outside the Pearl Harbor entrance Tuesday as Hurricane Iwa bore down on the island.

Indirectly related to the storm were the deaths of a Schofield Barracks soldier working on cleanup crew Friday, and two women who died in a collision at an intersection left without traffic signal by the excess power outage on Oahu.

The National Weather Service is still collecting data on the first hurricane to directly hit Hawaii in 23 years. Spokesman Clarence Lee said the highest preliminary storm reading came from points on Kauai where there were sustained winds of 90 mph and gusts to 110 mph.
