

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Texas is growing its own Christmas trees

The first snowfall on Christas morning and chestnuts pasting on an open fire are re-laced here with 70-degree temratures and perhaps a Christas barbeque.

And now, to replace another it of northern Christmas tradin — the northern-grown hristmas tree — Texas is growg its own.

A Texas-grown tree was donted this year to Texas A&M Iniversity and now stands in the nain foyer of the System Admi-

stration Building. The 12.5-foot tall Improved Virginia Pine was donated by K&K Evergreen Christmas Tree Farms of Orange County, one of 7 tree farms in the county which raise some 300,000 trees. The tree was delivered to the University on Dec. 3.

The Christmas tree growing ndustry in Texas is fairly new but rapidly growing, said Bill Bladen of the Texas Agricultural Extension Service.

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Originating about 10 years ago in East Texas, the tree busi-ness is so popular now that growers expect to sell over \$1.2 million in trees this year, Bladen said.

Popularity of the business also has prompted the forma-tion of the Texas Christmas Tree Growers Association which has more than 300 members. All the popularity is great for business but growers need to be careful, Bladen said.
