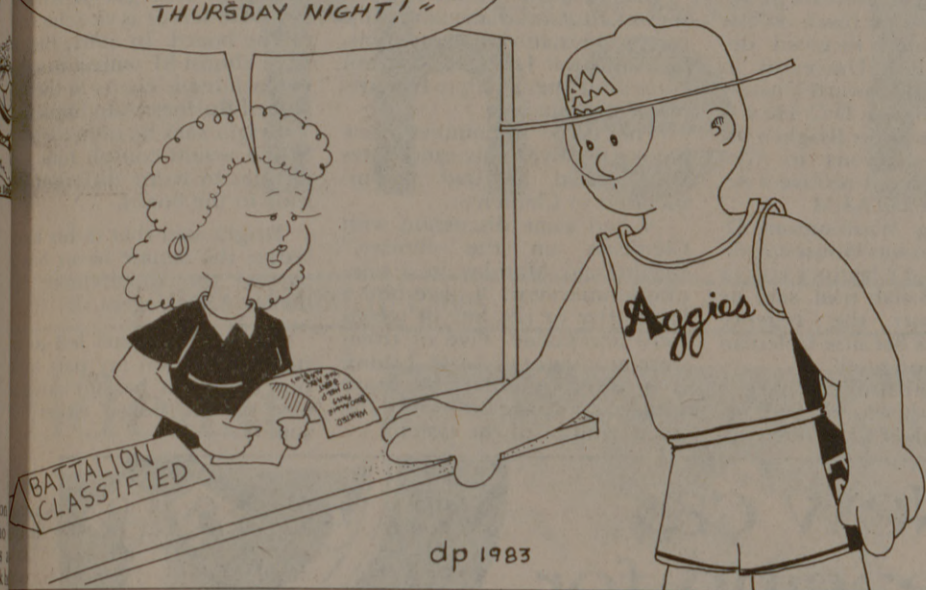

## Division I cut vetoed at NCAA convention

SAN DIEGO — Athletic directors at Division I colleges are breathing a sigh of relief at the defeat of a proposal that would have dropped some schools from the top collegiate athletic division.

Delegates to the NCAA convention defeated Proposal 71, a proposal that would have tightened requirements for membership in Division I by requiring a minimum attendance figure of 1,500 per basketball game, or 1,700 per football game. Many schools complained they would be unable to meet the attendance requirements because of limited seating and small markets to draw from.

The Rev. Charles Currie, president of Xavier University, said Proposal 71 violated the principles of the scholarship proposals overwhelmingly passed earlier in the day and would judge the quality of an athletic program on "the number of seats filled."

However, Big 10 Commissioner Wayne Duke said the defeated proposal was merely a way to "improve commonality of purpose within Division I."

Texas A&M University is a Division I school, as are the other eight members of the Southwest Conference.

In other action, the NCAA approved a cluster of measures that would require athletes to

study more in both high school and college.

"This is an issue no president can ignore," said Notre Dame President Rev. Edmond P. Joyce. "The issue is the exploitation of a 17-year-old athlete by putting him in a system he is woefully unprepared for."

The new academic standards, which take effect in 1986, require athletes to have a "C" average in a core of basic college-prep classes including mathematics, English, science and social science when they enter college.

Once in college, athletes would be required to keep their grades up and work toward a degree instead making a college career of taking easy courses.

## Spurs edge Mavs, 109-101

SAN ANTONIO — Mark Aguirre scored 33 points for the Dallas Mavericks, but the two free throws he missed at the end of the game gave San Antonio the edge and a 109-101 victory.

Aguirre scored 11 points in the fourth quarter Tuesday night, but missed two free throws with 21 seconds left and the Mavs trailing 104-101.

"The key play for them was Aguirre missing those free throws," San Antonio Coach

Stan Albeck said following the Spurs' victory over the struggling Mavericks.

"The free throw is so easy that it affects you psychologically."

Dallas held a 48-47 edge after a sluggish first half, behind 12 points from Aguirre and 10 from Rolando Blackman, who finished with 18 points. The lead, however, did not last long.

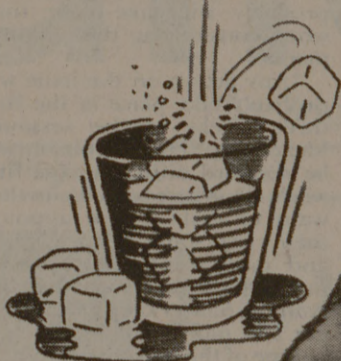
Paced by Gene Banks' 26 points and Artis Gilmore's season-high 21 rebounds, the Spurs

overcame a 78-73 third period deficit with a 9-0 burst to take an 88-82 lead with 8:22 left and never trailed again.

Dallas saw the possibility of a comeback in the fourth period, when Aguirre hit a three-point shot with 7:09 left in the period to bring the Mavericks within 92-86.

But Roger Phegley answered with his own three-pointer to bring San Antonio to 95-86 with 6:46 left.

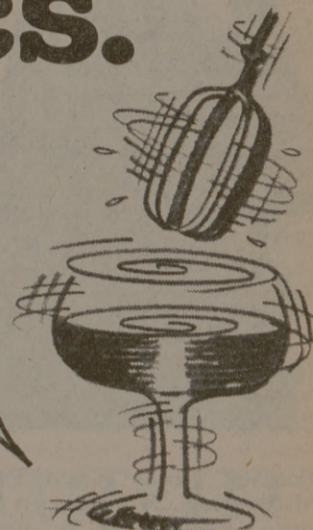
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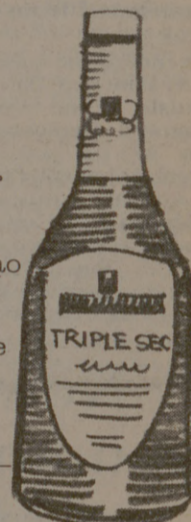


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
