GNP takes worst dive in years

United Press International WASHINGTON — The na-

tion's gross national product last year fell at an annual rate of 1.8 percent, the worst performance for the economy in 36 years and the final quarter's GNP plunged at an even steeper rate, the gov-ernment said today.

The October-December dropped at an annual rate of 2.5 percent, the Commerce Department reported, which contri-buted to the poor showing over all of 1982. In 1981, the GNP

grew by 1.9 percent.

Despite the gloomy news, administration figures said the year ended with some signs of improvement that still could generate economic recovery early this year.

At the White House, deputy press secretary Larry Speakes said the fourth-quarter figure closely paralleled an early look at the GNP provided last month.

"We fully expect the GNP will show steady improvement in the coming year," he said.

Commerce Secretary Malthe housing and auto sales sectors already is beginning an eco-

nomic recovery. The recovery of inflation throughout the ecowill be moderate, he said, but without further increase in the inflation rate

Administration economists said the year ended with some signs of improvement that could still generate an economic recovery early this year

The drop in GNP during the fourth quarter of last year was mainly the result of a general clearing of inventories, the surplus that was not replaced as sold, and a sharp downswing in export sales, the department

The fourth quarter setback was deeper than expected. Last month government economists projected the decline would be at an annual 2.2 percent rate.

The previous third quarter

had seen some weak improvement, at a 0.7 percent rate. The second quarter was up 2.1 per-

The brunt of the change from an expanding economy to one that was shrinking took Commerce Secretary Mal-colm Baldrige told a news con-ference that despite the fourth rate and then slumped further quarter decline, a rebound in in the first quarter of last year by another 5.1 percent.

Merger leaves 3,600 GM workers jobless

DETROIT—General Motors Corp. announced today it will

merge its Buick and Fisher Body divisions in Flint, Mich. by mid-1985, resulting in the loss of more than 3,600 jobs in the city with the nation's highest unemployment rate.

The automaker said the Buick plans to spend \$200 million to equip the plant to build front-wheel drive cars for the 1986 model year.

The Fisher Body plant will this as a tremendousw continue to operate through the fidence by General ! 1985 model year.

Currently, 8,600 people are employed at the Fisher Body and Buick plants, 5,200 at Fisher Body alone. After the consolidation, nearly 5,000 jobs will remain at what will be known as "Buick City," GM said.




