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Texas congressman suspect in drug case

WASHINGTON - Rep. Charles Wilson of Dallas, member of a committee investigating congressional drug use, is currently under investigation for allegedly using marijuana and cocaine.

NBC news reported Thursday that Wilson told correspondent Brian Ross that he attended parties in Houston and Las Vegas where cocaine was used, but denied using cocaine.

"But federal authorities in Washington say witnesses have told federal agents that they saw Congressman Wilson use marijuana and cocaine on a number of occasions in Texas, Nevada and Washington," Ross said.

Wilson, who lives in Arlington, Va., could not immediately be reached for comment.

Asked to comment on the allegations, Charles Simpson, administrative aide to Wilson, said Thursday night, "You'll have to talk to him."

Asked where he could be reached, Simpson said, "You just can't reach him. Not during tonight."

Another aide, Elaine Lang, told the Washington Post, "He (Wilson) doesn't even smoke cigarettes, adding that it seemed pretty silly" that someone would accuse Wilson of using cocaine.

A federal grand jury has been investigating alleged drug use by members of Congress on their staffs, hearing testimony that cocaine was actually used in a cloakroom just off the floor of the House of Representatives.

The Justice Department has refused to discuss the case, other than to say an investigation is continuing.

NBC said the investigation began with the arrest last April of Douglas Marshall, 27, a former congressional page who authorities say became one of Washington's biggest cocaine dealers, dealing to congressmen, members of the Washington press corps and socialites.

Federal authorities say that Marshall, now a fugitive believed to be in Australia, is being offered a deal by prosecutors to come back if he will agree to testify about his alleged cocaine customers in Washington.

In his report, Ross said members of the Committee on Standards of Official Conduct, and the House Ethics Committee, have been hearing secret testimony since July about allegations of drug use by members of Congress.

Rudolph Giuliani, an associate attorney general with the Justice Department, told NBC the investigation of drug use in Congress has a high priority even though it is unusual for the federal government to prosecute anyone for using small amounts of drugs.

"We have to hold public officials to a higher standard," Giuliani said.
