absenteeism. Target employment for a Westinghouse plant is between 300 and 1,000 persons. The plant will create about 400 jobs, Haines said. The working force at a Westinghouse plant cannot exceed 5 percent of the popula-tion, or 20 percent of the eligible

In addition, potential plant sites must be at least 50 acres in size or five times larger than the plant floor area, whichever is larger. They should be located on or near a major highway; access to a railroad is desireable but not required.
