Old Austin tavern, sing-in still popular

AUSTIN Kenneth Threadgill sits on a rickety wooden chair beneath a bevy of neon beer signs, opens his toothless mouth to yodel an old country ballad. Just as it has been for half a century, it's Wednesday night sing-in at Threadgill's tavern.

Threadgill, 73, and his tiny gas station-tavern have weathered the bootleg beer days of Prohibition, the rowdy rock-blues of Janis Joplin and the flames of two arsonists to endure as two of the Texas capital's most colorful landmarks.

Although Threadgill no longer owns the remodeled restaurant-bar that bears his name, he still yodels and sings his own special brand of country music there each Wednesday night.

Best known as the musical birthplace of the late Joplin, Threadgill's has remained a favorite eatery and watering hole for Austinites of all ages.

Threadgill has remained an Austin favorite, too, singing at music festivals throughout central Texas and even belting out a few tunes with Willie Nelson in the movie, "Honeysuckle Rose."

The feisty old singer said he and his tavern have continued to draw packed crowds for half a century because of the wide variety of their fans.

"The clientele could be a bunch of farmers wearing overalls standing at the bar next to a guy with a tuxedo," Threadgill said.

Threadgill's gas station sold dime-a-bottle "homebrew" beer from the time it opened in February 1933 until the day Prohibition ended in December of the same year. By the time Threadgill bought the first li-

what we called rock and roll then — was gonna come. But I said country would back and it did, with a bang.

The real heyday of Threadgill's tavern came in the late early '60s when the University of Texas fled from Port Arthur, became a regular at the Wednesday sing-ins.

"At first, she didn't sing more to me than any of the other kids because she wanted to come out and sing and play," Threadgill said.

"She tied up with Lammings, a banjo player, and from Laredo High School played a harmonica and we up the music around the of them."

"Janis was singing with high shrill voice of hers, she'd come around on boxes and beer kegs and ambulances could sit on at a round table and we passed it around."

"They were all kids then, she had a way of putting it, I figured she'd go places, she did."

After the city passed a new building and fire code in 1973 that made it impossible to have huge crowds to gather in the tavern, Threadgill closed place. An arsonist burned shack a year later, but that stop two enterprising men from reviving the spot.

Eddie Wilson was "desperately out of work" and his Kiri Ray Glenn "had gone for years and finally got it" when they approached Threadgill about buying ramshackle property.

"There'd been so much about Threadgill's in years and I thought the place probably do a lot of business we could clean it up," Wilson said.

"We told Kenneth we were to try to recreate the old place of the place just like the old and he reacted just like a kid in a candy store. We borrowed and stole, and it took two years to do it."
