

Airlines  
clash over  
PSA plan

DALLAS — A last minute campaign has been launched to persuade the Dallas and Fort Worth city councils to withhold approval of a proposed joint venture between Pacific Southwest Airlines and the defunct Braniff International. If successful, the effort Tuesday by American Airlines and other firms could halt a plan already approved by the Dallas-Fort Worth Regional Airport

Board and U.S. Bankruptcy Judge John Flowers. "We are concerned that PSA would be given preferential treatment by the airport board, which would violate our agreement with the board and would shift to us a disproportionate share of airport costs," said Gene Overbeck, senior vice president of American Airlines. Dallas Mayor Jack Evans said creating a Dallas-based Texas division of PSA would mean

more jobs in the north Texas area. Under terms of the joint venture, the California-based airline will lease 12 landing slots, 30 jets, and airport facilities once used by Braniff. The Dallas-Fort Worth Regional Airport Board, which has approved the deal, will decide who gets Braniff's office and hotel facility, Braniff Place. Braniff retains the right to sublease its jet simulator facility.

Joining the Bryan-College Station Chamber of Commerce is like making an investment in the future of the community, says Bob Kee, president of the Chamber Blazers.

The Blazers are a group of 22 Bryan-College Station businessmen who volunteer their time for the induction and orientation of new chamber members.

"We (the Blazers) have two objectives in 1983," Kee said. "The first of these is to generate a minimum of \$22,000 in new money for the chamber by recruiting new members, and secondly, to act as ambassadors to the community at grand openings, social events and public speeches."

"We contact businesses in the community that are not members of the chamber and ask them to join the chamber and support it with both time and money."

There are two ways to join the chamber. One is by businesses making a minimum contribution of \$125, he said. But larger, established businesses usually increase the size of their yearly contribution according to their volume of business.

The second is designed to accommodate individuals, rather than businesses. An individual membership requires a \$50 minimum contribution, and is seldom increased from that amount, Kee said.

Kee's employer, Louis Newman, who owns Newman Printing Co. in Bryan, not only makes a substantial yearly contribution, but also is a member of the chamber's board of directors and executive committee.

The Blazers have scheduled a one-day spring membership drive for sometime in April, Kee said. On that day, they will canvass the community asking all non-member businesses to join the chamber.

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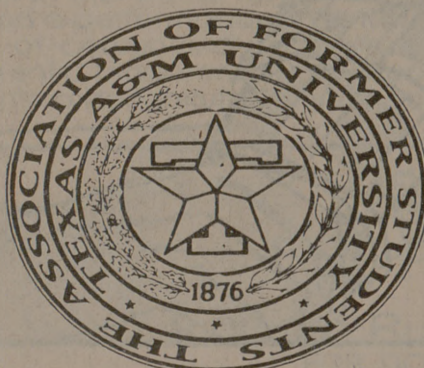

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## NRC orders tests

DALLAS — The Nuclear Regulatory Commission Tuesday ordered testing on possibly faulty water pumps used in nuclear power plants, including the Comanche Peak plant near Glen Rose, which is about 50 miles southwest of Dallas.

The announcement came nearly a year after an NRC official in Arlington was transferred after "softening" a critical report

on the pumps. The Arlington office had national jurisdiction to monitor the quality of that equipment.

The NRC said the problems it verified in quality control and training procedures at Hayward Tyler Pump Co. in Burlington, Vt., posed questions about the reliability of the equipment manufactured there. The commission ordered that the pumps and related equipment, sold to

22 nuclear power plants inspected and tested. Only pumps manufactured between 1979 and 1981 were affected.

Dick Ramsey, a spokesman for Comanche Peak, where the pumps have been used since 1981, said the NRC quest did not raise serious questions there because pumps were not being used in the reactor's safety system.

Ramsey said the pumps used to deliver cool water to the plant's auxiliary systems, as well as its air conditioning.

Question about the pumps surfaced in December 1981 when several former Hayward Tyler employees complained to Rep. Edward Markey, D-Mass., of allegedly shoddy workmanship and training at the plant. The NRC ordered a review of the company's manufacturing and training procedures.

Last year, Karl Seyfried, administrator of the NRC's Arlington office, and John Lins, the office's head auditor, came under strong criticism from some members of Congress, including Markey, allowing Hayward Tyler representatives to examine a preliminary draft of his findings.

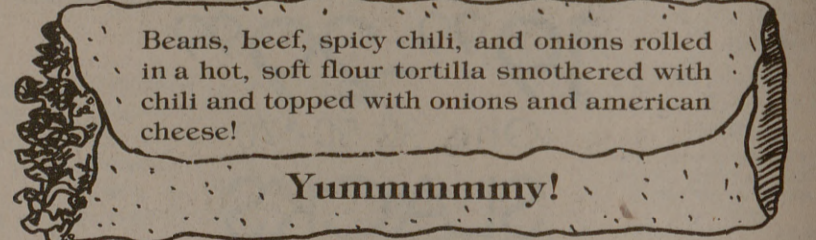
