## Dorm opens weight room

Long lines for the weight machines at DeWare Field House shouldn't stop Hart Hall residents from staying in shape. Last Sunday, Hart Hall opened its own weight room in the basement of the dormitory.

We have the best facility on campus besides the weight rooms in Deware and the athletic facilities," said David Haw-kins, president of the Hart Hall

Weightlifting Club.
Planning for the weight room started last October. After the project was approved by the Central Area Office, Hawkins said, he went to Texas A&M weightlifting instructor Emil Mamaliga for advice. Mamaliga is the author of the textbook for

weight training classes at Texas the weight room.

Mamaliga showed him how to use a floor plan of the basement to set up stations for different activities and also recommended amounts of weights that would be needed at each station, Haw-

David Corry, secretary of the weightlifting club, said most of the weights were loaned to them by Hart Hall residents. Also, the dorm council donated \$425 to the project, which Hawkins said the weight club members used to buy cleaning supplies and an additional 400 pounds of weights.

Mark Bauma, one of the weight club members, built two benches and a sit up board for

Hawkins said the equipment in the room is arranged in stations, as Mamaliga advised. Pages from the weightlifting textbook, illustrating different exercises and recommending weight amounts, are posted at each station.

Corry and Hawkins said they received an overwhelming response to a petition they circulated through the dormitory to

determine the level of interest in the project. However, the turnout so far has not been as good as they expected, Hawkins said. Most residents just aren't aware that the new weight room is

Only Hart Hall residents with paid activity fees can use the weight room, but Corry said that they might consider opening the facility to other students if it is not used more often.

Dr. Haskell Monroe Jr. Faculty Distinguished Achievement Award in Teaching and


the Distinguished Alumnus

He is married and has four children, two of which are attending Texas A&M.

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
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
