## PUC appointee disputes White's 'lapdog' criticism

**United Press International AUSTIN** — One of Gov. Mark White's two appointees to the embattled Public Utility Commission has contradicted White's criticism that the panel is captive to the state utility companies.

White appointed Alan Erwin, 38, and El Paso housewife Peggy Rosson, 47, to fill the vacancies created by the surprise resignations Tuesday of George Cowden and Tommie Gene Smith.

The governor, who campaigned on a promise to make the PUC more responsive to

ratepayers, has claimed the panel is a "lap dog" to the utility industry.

"One thing I can assure you, the Texas Public Utility Commission as it exists now is not a captive of the utility industry," Erwin said Wednesday.

Rather, Erwin faulted the PUC for being too investor-oriented instead of consumer-oriented.

"I think that (the PUC) gives more emphasis to the equity return, to what Wall Street tells them a utility needs to remain financially strong, than I think is

warranted," he said. "Wall street analysts don't care anything about the rates people pay in Texas."

Erwin said an analyst from a private New York firm that rates the regulatory climate in certain states advised him that Texas' rating would be dropped a notch because of the resignations and subsequent appointments.

"My response was it was good that the Texas Public Utility Commission no longer was Wall Street's favorite regulatory agency," he said.

Erwin is vice president of Houston office manager Hill & Knowlton, a large relations firm which does business with some Texas utilities and served on the member Texas utility regulatory agency from 1975 until 1978.

In response to questions about possible conflict of interest, Dilenschneider of Hill & Knowlton said the firm's operations, including company work for Dallas-based utility companies like Electric & Light Co. and Texas & Light Co., but he said he was not involved in the

## U.S. appeals court rules:

# HISD integration plan OK

**United Press International NEW ORLEANS** — A federal appeals court ruled that the Houston Independent School District has done all it can to eradicate the remnants of state-imposed segregation.

"Even if some method were devised to spread white students equally among all schools in the system, 74 percent of the students in each school would be black and Hispanic," the 5th U.S. Circuit Court of Appeals said Wednesday.

"There are not enough white students left in the district to effect greater integration of student bodies without untoward

costs on the students themselves," the appeals court said.

The case dates to 1956, when a group of black parents filed suit to desegregate schools in the district. The parents challenged overlapping racially segregated attendance zones.

The 5th Circuit agreed with a U.S. district judge in Texas that the school district has become desegregated after 25 years of court proceedings and 12 years of court supervision under a court-ordered desegregation plan.

The appeals court received the case after the trial judge refused a request to add 26 defen-

dants and seek an inter-district remedy which would force students from the predominantly white suburban districts to attend school in Houston, while HISD students went to the suburban districts.

The appeals court said even though the school district "has not achieved integrated student attendance," it has tried.

"During the past 12 years of court-supervised desegregation, HISD and the successive trial judges who have presided over this litigation have made sustained good-faith efforts to create a unitary school system," the appeals court said.

The court noted that black and Hispanic populations increases each year, while white population declines.

"During the 12 years of 1970 when the first desegregation plan took effect, racial segregation within the district has increased dramatically," the court said.

The district court will again review the case to determine whether it should be dismissed, the appeals court said, adding that new allegations of racial discrimination are possible.

# Beating death case upheld in

**United Press International AUSTIN** — The murder conviction Wednesday of a Corpus Christi man who said he whipped his daughter to death with a rod because a preacher told him rebellious children need to be spanked has been upheld by the Texas Court of Criminal Appeals.

In 1977 Vicente Montelongo, 32, was convicted in the beating death of his daughter, Christine, 4, who was thrashed with a belt and fishing rod.

Montelongo's lawyers argued his sentence of life imprisonment should be overturned because the prosecuting attorney, in his closing remarks to the jury, read a hypothetical letter to Christine, calling the dead girl a beautiful child and one of God's very own treasures.

A psychiatrist's report showed Montelongo had listened to tape recordings of sermons by a Baptist preacher, Buddy Murphree, before the

beating. "He (Murphree) stated that a rebellious person should be punished with a rod," the report said. "The preacher related that you should whip the child until you break his spirit. The child will not die because spanking is a good thing."

The court ruled, by a narrow 5-4 decision, that although the prosecutor's tactics were in poor taste, they constituted no grounds for overturning Mon-

telongo's conviction. "In other action, the court ordered new trials for Billy McCormick and Billy Johnson, ruling the men's prosecution by the state attorneys after their 1976 murder trial constituted a conflict of interest."

The men were sentenced to death for the shotgun slaying of Earl Hammond, the manager of a Panola County grocery store and the father of two

# Remains reveal ancient life

**United Press International DALLAS** — A Baylor University professor says the skeletons of an Ice Age man and child found in a cave near Waco could

be among the oldest human remains ever discovered in the Western Hemisphere.

The remains are estimated by archaeologists to be some 10,000 years old and if so, might predate the remains of a woman found by state anthropologists at a burial site near Round Rock recently.

Operations for excavating the cave site, located some 20 miles northwest of Waco on the

banks of the Brazos River, have been conducted for 15 years under the direction of the Central Texas Archaeological Society.

John W. Fox, associate professor of sociology and anthropology at Baylor, said Wednesday the findings could provide science with its first systematic view of man's ideological or religious patterns during this period.

He said the skeletons of the oldest human remains discovered in Texas are the oldest in the Western Hemisphere. Fox termed the site's findings a "national treasure."

Found with the remains were a number of items that he said were prepared by the inhabitants for their "next world," Fox said.

"The remains are more than a half dozen years old," he said. "The skeletons are of Paleo-Indian skeletons, far. They are the only burial remains found in the Western Hemisphere with a wide array of burial goods."

Also found were the remains of several extinct animals, including a giant armadillo, a sloth and a large turtle. The remains, ranging from large and deer skeletons to small animals such as rabbits, rats, turtle, fish, snakes and birds, also were discovered.

Fox said a new flint point may have been used to hunt these animals.

"Many of these bones charred from cooking could be among the oldest in North America showing a small game subsistence economy at about 10,000 years ago. Previously, this was characterized by the Archaic stage, beginning out 8,000 years ago."

The skeletons were buried, except for the stone slab. The head of the skeleton was resting on a shell. Fox said the site could suggest some ritual significance.

The cave also yielded evidence of habitation by cultural groups spanning more than 10,000 years into the present century. The remains include other artifacts including arrow points, pottery and 20th century iron artifacts.
