The MSC Videotape Committee made a special bid for funds. The committee has drawn up plans for the Texas A&M University Student Entertainment Network, which would be a student-oriented cable television station broadcast to all residence halls and lounges on campus. The group asked the finance committee to approve the allocation of \$25,289 of student service fees for the creation of TAMSEN.

The finance committee voted on all requests for student service fee allocations during a closed meeting on Saturday. It's decision will be forwarded to Vice President for Student Services Dr. John L. Koldus. From there the request moves to Van-diver and then to the Texas A&M Board of Regents.




