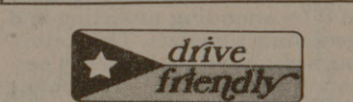

Financial aid stability also may be attributed to the low default rate on loans awarded by the University, Bormann said. Texas A&M has a default rate of approximately 3 percent compared to a 21 percent national and state default rate, he said.

Bormann said the low default rate has allowed them to continue such aid programs as the federal Health Professions Student Loan program. Funds for this program are allocated for

institutions with a 5 percent or lower default rate.

According to figures compiled by the financial aid office, Texas A&M showed a 3 percent drop in the percentage of its enrollment receiving Pell grant money in the three-year period between 1980 and 1983.

In the same three-year period, Texas Tech University showed a 6 percent drop and the University of Texas showed a 4 percent drop in the percentage of students receiving grant money.

The decreases reflect a stiffening of eligibility requirements in the Pell grant program, but also reflect each university's consistency in providing aid, Bormann said.

Although Texas A&M provided \$1 million less in Pell grant money than UT, the University was more consistent in the amount it provided from year to year in comparison with other schools.

Approximately one-third of the total enrollment here receives some form of financial

aid. This aid amounts to almost \$40 million in 1983, Bormann said.

Although Texas financial aid programs are a main staple, cuts in 1984 could cause some students ineligible for aid, Bormann said. The federal government proposed a requirement that students provide 40 percent self-help in funding their education before they can receive assistance through federal programs.

ISA elects new president in close run-off election

In a run-off election Friday night, the International Students Association elected a new president who won by a single vote.

Dayan Adihetty, an agricultural economics doctoral student from Sri Lanka, was elected 1983-84 president of the ISA in a run-off election between himself and Sophia Iliadou of Greece, who led by one-third of a vote after the first ballot.

The ISA voting system is similar to the voting process used by the United Nations. Each country, rather than each person, casts one vote which can

be split fractionally for different candidates.

As the new ISA president, Adihetty said he hopes to focus more closely on the various needs of foreign students.

"I don't think we should focus just on parties," he said. "We want to meet every need of the international student — academic, personal and social."

He said he wants to develop programs in which foreign students can receive more help with academics — especially students in their first year at Texas A&M.

"I would like to get our seniors in the various departments to work with new students," he said. "I want to make

ISA a service organization also."

The ISA needs more participation from other foreign students on campus, Adihetty said.

He said he also would like the ISA to work more closely with MSC committees.

Other executive officers elected Friday were: Peter Chung of Taiwan, vice president; Valentine James of Nigeria, secretary; Martin Wells of Uruguay, treasurer; Steve Bong of Indonesia, public relations director; and Nazim Nemer of the United Arab Emirates, member-at-large.

The ISA is part of the Office of Student Services. It coordinates

the 40 international organizations on campus and aids through financial support and publicity.

Tina Watkins, Intern Student Services and Manager, said ISA is an organization for all the foreign students on campus.

"American students are too — they are also international students," she said. One of the major events of the ISA calendar is International Week, which will be from March 28 to 31. It features a food festival, a talent show featuring national dress and scheduled

Dorms receive repair funds

Residence halls at Texas A&M will receive about \$1.5 million worth of maintenance and renovation this summer, a housing official says.

Campus Housing Operations Supervisor Glenn Ferris said about \$500,000 will be spent to replace furniture and mattresses in several dormitories, and \$1 million will be used for renovations including new windows, paint and safety devices.

Law and Puryear halls will receive chests and desks. Law, Puryear, Hughes and Fowler halls will receive new mattresses, Ferris said.

A portion of the \$1.5 million will be used to paint the

of McInnis and Schuler halls along with hallways, areas and 60 rooms in Law and Dunn halls, he said. New tinted windows installed in Corps-style buildings 6 and 8, Ferris said. Dorm 8 also will have new hall pet installed.

Safety equipment on peep-holes, and emergency lights will be the women's modular dorms, said Ferris.

The new furniture is a five-year plan to replace furniture in all residence halls, he said.
