

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they lose, there won't be any shootout with Houston," said Arkansas coach Eddie Sutton. Houston isn't going to lose.

In addition to the games involving two of the nation's top-rated clubs, the Texas A&M Aggies will face TCU in a game critical to the league's postseason tournament and the Texas Longhorns will be at the home against Baylor.

Houston will take a 22-2 season record and a spotless SWC slate into its meeting with Rice, a team that has beaten the Cougars only once in 24 tries.

The Cougars have won 17 games in a row and 21 straight conference outings — the longest such streak in 54 years.

Arkansas, meanwhile, will be going for its 100th home victory since the arrival of Sutton in Fayetteville. The Razorbacks have lost only four conference games at home under Sutton.
