United Press International GREENVILLE, N.C. — An explosion believed caused by

leaking gas ripped through a three-story apartment building housing mostly college students shortly before dawn Tuesday, killing one person and injuring

at least 12 others.
"We heard people screaming.
There was a girl that had been blown into a tree that was beside the apartments," said Frank Gargano, who lives in a building across from the one that was des-

Gargano said the girl received only a cut on her forehead.

Police first said two people had been killed in the explosion, but at mid-morning they said the death toll was one.

"I opened my eyes and there was smoke everywhere," said Vivien Lo, a foreign student attending East Carolina University. "I had been blown to the other side of my bed.'

Sue Holloman, resident manager of the Village Green apartment complex, said 40 to 45 peosaid six to eight apartments were destroyed or heavily damaged.
