Since entrants must be students at Texas A&M, Earle said, the contest will be a great opportunity to integrate academics

into a learning process. He said papers should con-tain research and a study of the history surrounding the use of firearms from 1865 to 1900.

The prize awards are \$200 for first place, \$125 for second place and \$75 for third place. Although cash awards will be


