Take long-range bomber Kenny Brown, who's averaged 9.9 points a game during the Aggies' 17-13 season. When it comes to answering questions about Texas A&M and its chances in the Southwest Conference tournament, Brown has his answers ready. He didn't have to study all night to figure out his response to this question:

Q. "Some of your teammates think you guys can beat the Razorbacks if you play them in the tournament. How about

A. "Because we're just as good as they are," Brown said with a grin. "They just have a better record.'

Brown's not the only player who's excited about the tournament. Senior forward Claude Riley sees great possibilities for the Aggies in the near future.

"I believe a lot of things can happen if we keep playing the way we're playing now," he said after the Aggies defeated the Raiders. "We've really improved our play a lot during the last few games. We feel really good and very comfortable with the team. We think that with our enthusiasm, we can go to the tournament and play well in it.

A. "We've really picked up our intensity a lot during the last few games, but since we played Arkansas in Fayetteville (losing 62-55), we've been controlling the tempo of every game. The key to the success we're having is the intensity, because I feel we were really lacking in intensity earlier in the season.

A. "I feel like on a neutral court, we've got 'em. We played them tight in both games this year, so we know we can beat them anywhere we play. 


