## Drug use on Hill studied

# Probe won't yield charges

WASHINGTON — The Justice Department has not accumulated enough evidence to bring criminal charges against congressmen accused of illegal drug use, but is continuing its probe, *The Washington Post* reported today.

The Justice Department began its probe into the alleged use of marijuana and cocaine by some congressmen last year, despite what one law enforcement official told the *Post* was "the baldest unsubstantiated allegations."

In beginning the probe last year, the department, interested primarily in drug dealers, broke a longstanding policy not to investigate alleged drug users. The department was reluctant to use a stiffer standard for investigating government officials than used for private citizens, but also was fearful of cover-up charges, the newspaper said.

Charges of drug use on Capitol Hill also are being investigated by the House Ethics Committee.

Investigators have inter-

viewed dozens of people, but so far have brought only a few witnesses before a 23-member grand jury that is hearing testimony about this and other investigations.

Three current and former congressmen have been named as subjects of the probe in numerous reports: Reps. Ronald Dellums, D-Calif., and Charles Wilson, D-Texas, and former Rep. Barry Goldwater Jr., R-Calif.

The *Post*, citing unidentified sources, said most of the information against the three men is

either hearsay or one word against another.

Sources told the *Post* that the investigation of Goldwater is complete and that department officials in the past commended no charges.

The department has acted on the recommendations. The allegations against Dellums were made before a grand jury by an employee of the House doorkeeper Robert Yesh, who said cocaine was used on occasions.

## Files shows FBI feared Lennon

LOS ANGELES — John Lennon's FBI file outlines a relentless government effort to deport the former Beatle in the early 1970s for fear he would lead a massive anti-war demonstration against Richard Nixon.

Because the FBI documents are heavily censored, the American Civil Liberties Union prepared Tuesday to file a federal court lawsuit challenging the government's right to keep its files secret. Entire passages are blocked out with heavy black ink for what the FBI calls national security reasons.

The FBI and immigration files, released under the U.S.

Freedom of Information Act and published in today's *Los Angeles Times*, show Lennon hoped to arrest the last musician on drug charges otherwise "neutralize" him could be deported before the 1972 Republican Convention.

Jon Wiener, a historian at the University of California, Irvine, requested for a book he is writing on Lennon and the politics of the 1960s. Wiener joined ACLU suit.

Although Lennon's Yoko Ono, was asked to file the lawsuit, longtime friend Elliot Mintz said the experience would be painful for her.
