Drug use on Hill studied

Probe won't yield charges

United Press International WASHINGTON — The Justice Department has not accumulated enough evidence to bring criminal charges against congressmen accused of illegal drug use, but is continuing its probe, The Washington Post reported today.

The Justice Department began its probe into the alleged use of marijuana and cocaine by some congressman last year, despite what one law enforcement official told the Post were "the baldest unsubstantiated allega-

In beginning the probe last year, the department, interested primarily in drug dealers, broke a longstanding policy not to investigate alleged drug users. The department was reluctant to use a stiffer standard for investigating government officials than used for private citizens, but also was fearful of cover-up charges, the newspaper said.

Charges of drug use on Capi-tol Hill also are being investigated by the House Ethics Com-

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Investigators have inter-

viewed dozens of people, but so either hearsay or o far have brought only a few witnesses before a 23-member grand jury that is hearing testimony about this and other investigations.

Three current and former congressmen have been named as objects of the probe in numer-ous reports: Reps. Ronald De-llums, D-Calif., and Charles Wilson, D-Texas, and former Rep. Barry Goldwater Jr., R-Calif.

The Post, citing unidentified sources, said most of the information against the three men is occassions.
