(continued from page 1) psychological advancement. We are ready to share military secrets with you." Evrony said he feels the U.S.-Israel relationship is good and that it has not been damaged because of President Reagan's policy to avoid confrontation

with Lebanon. "I think President Reagan is a friend of Israel," he said. "He understands the unique relationship between the United States and Israel. (Reagan understands) the fact that Israel is the only reliable ally the United States has in the Middle East — the only country that is a for-

truss against Soviet advancement."

Evrony said he wants to make people understand Israel's position in its struggle to increase democracy in the Middle East. He said Israel's success in liberating its northern border emphasizes his country's need for safety in its independence.

"People in this area don't have to live in shelters anymore," he said. "It is quiet, they are free, they are safe."

(continued from page 1) schools choose not to join (an accrediting body), because they don't want any controls," he said. But those are the exceptions and most of them are the small colleges with religious affiliations, he said.

And that's perfectly all right, he said, because affiliation with Southern Association of Colleges and Schools is voluntary. "Within each of (the six accreditation regions) each university and college, which wishes to affiliate — all do not — joins together, sends representatives to what is called a delegate assembly, and they set the criteria."

And for the past few decades, the delegates have decided on 11 particular criteria, or standards.

Adams said: "So they set a

series of standards — one on the purpose of the university, the second deals with administration, the third deals with all educational programs, the fourth with all financial business and so on.

"And what they do then, is within each of those criteria they say 'ideally all colleges and universities should do thus and so.' And they set up long, long lists of sub-headings under each of those criteria. So what accreditation boils down to you see, is meeting each of those criteria. And you have to meet all of them."

The 12 Standards Committees, which recently have finished their reports, each reviewed one of the 11 standards set by the association. The extra committee reviewed University computer facilities, a task Texas A&M undertook on its own initiative, Adams said.

The reports of the Standards Committees and of the University departments and colleges are not the end of the accreditation process, however.

On April 17, a group of about 30 distinguished scholars will arrive here from throughout the United States, Adams said. And

that group, representing Southern Association of Colleges and Schools, will whether Texas A&M is accredited.

"What happens next is accreditation is granted or not," Adams said. "And to make sure it's up and up, they send a team called an Affirmation accreditation Committee to campus."

"They come and inspect, allowed to poke and snoop and interview whatever they want. And they meet after three days they say: 'Yes, in fact, they meet the criteria but you ought to pay attention to this and that and the other they can if they wish — we will not re-affirm accreditation until you do this and this and this.'"
