"The difference is between a regimented life (and) one that's structured only to the extent that the individual wants," Simpson said.

Because the Corps is a regimented structure, Simpson said, there are probably few cadets who haven't at some time thought about getting out. However, there are rewards, he said, such as a free night out for good grades at mid-term.

But while the Corps is set up along military lines, it is not a true military organization. The commanders don't have the tools to command that those in the military have, nor should they, Simpson said.

"They have to lead by persuasion rather than orders, and that's a challenging job," he said. "When the Corps closes ranks and decides to do something, it's a tremendously powerful organization."

The strength and unity of the Corps comes not from its 2,300 students but from the individual outfits of about 50 students, Simpson said.

The Corps is divided into

four major units, the brigade, the wing, the regiment and the band, which are further broken down into smaller units. Classification of cadets usually is balanced within the units. The students of a unit usually live on the same floor together in an area according to their class or major.

Mike Holmes, Corps commander, said units are divided in this manner so members of a unit and class can work and do things together and help each other out.

"The goal is to be unified with buddies and work together to achieve common goals," Holmes said.

When one student must do push ups, his buddies also must push with him. This practice, which has evolved over the last twenty years, helps promote unity, he said.

Simpson, who was in the Corps from 1932 to 1936, said that today the Corps is 100 percent better than when he was a student.

"It is a lot better Corps all around just as it's a better University," he said. "But still, as in any form of human endeavor, there is a lot of room for improvement."

Simpson also said several mer students he has talked to attribute their success in business world to the skills learned in the Corps at handling, motivating and organizing people.

The military formations, sroom instructors and lifers are better, the school is more difficult academically, the students seem to be brighter people, the Corps does things better said.

The students in the Corps also seem to be a very push group of people.

"The idea of a Corps would have killed us," Simpson said of the Corps he was in. "About the only thing that's the same are the senior who they haven't changed, except for the price."

The admission of women to the Corps and the opening of the school to civilian students also changed the Corps and University, he said. If the university was still all military, only would have about 5,000 6,000 students, Simpson said.

"Those two steps opened the door to changing A&M from cow college in the Brazos Valley to a university."
