Hill first candidate for chief justice

AUSTIN — Getting the jump on other prospective candidates, former state Attorney General John Hill says he plans to campaign in 1984 for chief justice of the Texas Supreme Court.

Hill, a Democrat, filed a campaign treasurer designation Monday with the secretary of state's office, naming himself as treasurer, and taking the first step toward becoming an official candidate.

Hill, 59, has been a private attorney in Austin since former Republican Gov. Bill Clements

defeated him in the 1978 gubernatorial election, one of the state's most stunning political upsets.

He is seeking to succeed Chief Justice Jack Pope, who was promoted to chief justice last year by Clements to fill the unexpired term of Joe Greenhill. Pope has said he will not seek election to the post.

Hill said he began his campaign earlier than usual "to raise a little money." He expects the campaign to cost as much as \$300,000.

Gripping inmate found dead

BROWNWOOD — An inmate in the Brown County jail was found dead in his cell the same day a local newspaper received a letter from the inmate and other prisoners complaining about conditions at the jail.

Sixteen prisoners signed the petition sent to the Brownwood Bulletin Monday. One of them was Jacky Lynn Barnett, who was found at 2:30 a.m. in his cell, authorities said.

Sheriff Melvin Stovall said Barnett, 27, had been jailed since March 26 on misdemeanor charges of driving while his license was suspended and possession of marijuana and a felony charge of possession of hashish.

Stovall said he did not think foul play was involved in the prisoner's death, but an autopsy was ordered.

The petition, dated March 28, included complaints about a

lack of available medical treatment for prisoners who become ill. It said one prisoner in jail at the time the petition was written was suffering from high blood pressure, but the prisoner's name was not given.

A member of Barnett's family said he previously received treatment for high blood pressure, but had not been taking medication recently.

A jailer said Barnett had shown no signs of illness since

his incarceration. Sheriff's department officials said Barnett told officers when he was jailed that he suffered no ailments and was not currently on medication.

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
