Hardy said when he opened the door to the room he saw a woman wearing only a nightgown. He said he suffered a ruptured spinal disc from "bolting out" of the motel room.

A jury Tuesday ordered Days Inn of America Inc. to pay Hardy \$25,000. He had sought \$225,000.

"I was shocked to find someone in that room when I entered it," Hardy testified. "I'm not used to going into rooms where there are skimpily clad women. When I saw that woman in there, all I knew is I wanted to get out of there.'
