

Braniff chief financial officer Philip Guthrie said the total Hyatt proposal was deficient by as much as \$60 million based on the skies, saying the financial offer was not adequate.

Under the proposal, the bankrupt airline's creditors would have been required to subsidize the company with as much as \$50 million by taking new notes for the amounts of

money they are owed. In return, the hotel chain would have gotten a tax break of \$360 million, the amount Bra-

The plan would have used 30 of Braniff's idled jet fleet and rehired some 2,000 former employees of the airline.

Braniff has until next Monday to present a reorganization plan to federal bankruptcy Judge John Flowers.
