Illegal firework factory owner jailed after explosion kills

United Press International BENTON, Tenn. — The owner of an illegal firework factory faces 11 counts of involuntary manslaughter for the deaths of his mother, brother, uncle and eight other people in an explosion at his hidden business in the southeast Tennessee mountains.

Dan Lee Webb, 30, surrendered at the Polk County Jail around midnight Saturday — 26 hours after a nationwide alert had been issued for him.

He was charged Sunday with 11 counts of involuntary manslaughter and illegally manufac-

turing and possessing explo-sives. He was jailed under sives. He was jailed under \$300,000 bond pending a June 2
