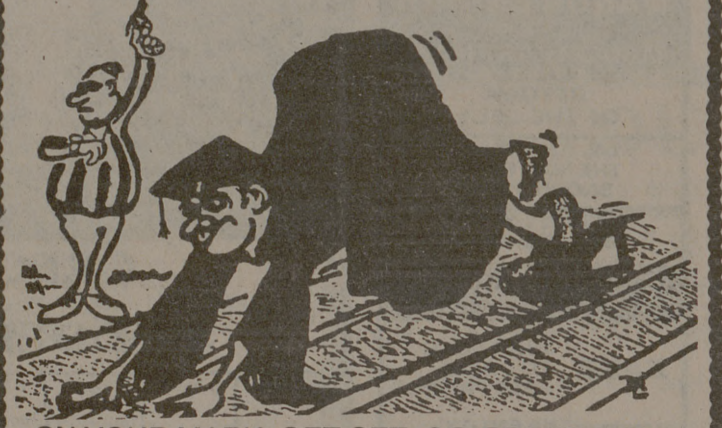

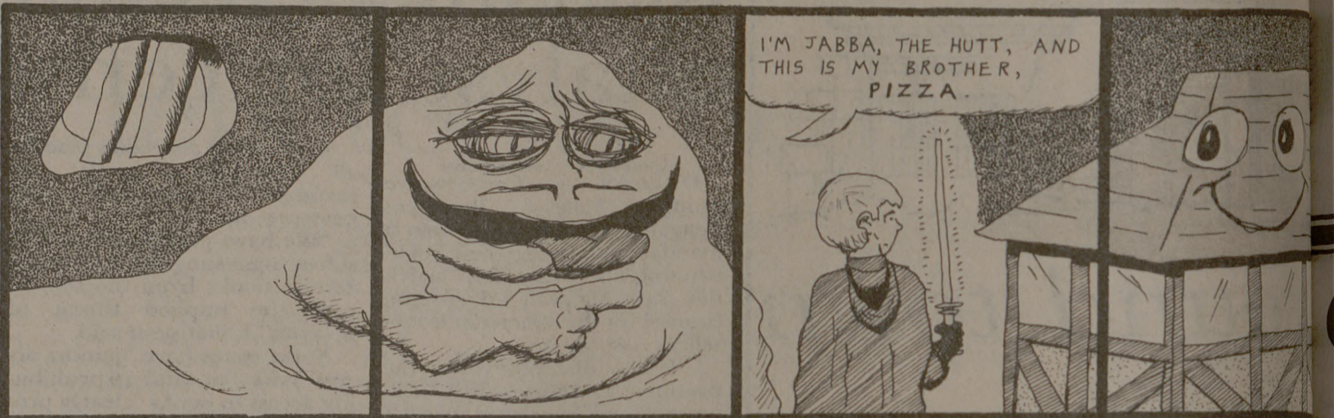

Officials will not comment

Paper says agents 'spied'

United Press International DALLAS — Federal authorities are refusing to comment on a newspaper report that claimed the Bureau of Alcohol, Tobacco & Firearms agents investigating an alleged conspiracy to blow up the Comanche Peak nuclear power plant spied on two anti-nuclear groups.

The 1979 AT&F investigation involved an undercover agent who infiltrated the Armadillo Coalition and the Comanche Peak Life Force with court-ordered wiretaps and extensive surveillance of the activists groups, the Dallas Times Herald reported Sunday.

The newspaper reported the federal agency mounted the investigation following three acts of vandalism at power substations and relied on data supplied by an informer about the alleged plot to blow up the nuclear plant at Glen Rose.

The Times Herald story was based on investigative documents obtained by the anti-nuclear groups under the Freedom of Information Act.

Jim Schermbeck, one of the founders of the Comanche Peak Life Force, said he was amazed to learn of the scope of the federal investigation into the alleged plan to bomb the nuclear

plant. "The whole purpose of our group is non-violence," Schermbeck said. "For us to do something like that would be pretty far-fetched."

The newspaper story said the documents indicated investigators were concerned that an attempt would be made to bomb the Comanche Peak plant southwest of Dallas during a June 10, 1979, protest. Despite a search, no bomb was found at the protest, which came off peacefully and ended with the arrest of about 45 protesters who scaled a fence around the plant.

The Times Herald reported

the investigative documents indicated an informer from the east Dallas neighborhood of Charles Young, the person behind the plot to blow up the nuclear

plant. Young's telephone number was given in December by the Times Herald reported.

Young said he attended an anti-nuclear demonstration, and a friend of his, Young never was a member of the group.

Climbers to face charges

United Press International HOUSTON — A pair of daredevils who scaled two of the city's tallest buildings have learned what goes up must come down.

Roy Broyles, 29, of Los Angeles, and David Adcock, 21, of Dallas, who climbed Houston skyscrapers in separate stunts, were scheduled to face criminal trespassing charges in court appearances Monday.

Broyles climbed the granite walls of the 75-story Texas Com-

merce Bank Tower March 14 by using climbing gear attached to window washing grooves while Adcock, who also identifies himself as Skip Stanley, scaled the 71-story glass-walled Allied Bank Plaza May 16 with suction cups.

Broyles' case was scheduled to go before a jury before County Court-at-Law Judge Al Leal. Broyles' attorney, James Moriarty, said he expected the trial to last about two days.

Adcock was scheduled to

appear before County Court-at-Law Judge Robert Musslewhite for a pre-trial hearing.

Both climbers were charged with criminal trespass. Adcock faces an additional charge of resisting arrest after he para-sailed to the ground.

Broyles, wearing a white tuxedo, ruffled shirt and black tie, took almost 20 hours to reach the top of Houston's tallest skyscraper, only to be arrested by waiting police on criminal trespassing charges.

Adcock's stunt, however, took only 14 hours and ended when

he para-sailed to the ground.

The aspiring stuntman, who was dressed in a blue mask and later said he actually was ready to jump, scrambled to save his life when he was arrested.

Adcock had no previous experience climbing skyscrapers, but Broyles reportedly climbed the United States Bank Plaza building in Orlin, Tenn., Atlanta's Peachtree Plaza Hotel, Los Angeles' Interstate Bank Building and San Francisco's American Pyramid.

State's unemployment falls slightly in May

United Press International AUSTIN — The Texas Employment Commission reported Monday that the state's jobless rate fell slightly in May to 8 percent but also warned that a full-fledged economic recovery has not yet occurred.

TEC labor market specialist Diane Dobie said the actual un-

employment rate fell from 8.1 percent in April to a rate of 8.0 percent for May. The seasonally adjusted rate fell from 8.6 to 8.1 percent in May, she said.

Dobie said the figures meant 596,100 Texans were out of work in May, a reduction of 74,200 from the previous month.

Killings described as 'Manson-style'

United Press International CHINO, Calif. — Police found one weapon used by intruders who herded a family of four and a visiting neighbor boy into a bedroom of their rural home and then stabbed them repeatedly, leaving only one survivor.

Monday police began searching for the three suspects.

One of the first deputies on the scene Sunday afternoon described the bloodbath as "a Manson-style" slaughter, referring to the 1969 killings of seven people, including actress Sharon Tate, by followers of cult leader Charles Manson.

"I've never seen anything like what was in that house," said the paramedic dispatched to the home. "I've heard stories of the Charles Manson thing, and I'm sure this was as bad, if not worse."

San Bernardino County Sheriff Floyd Tidwell, however, said the killings were "not ritualistic, just very brutal."

The slayings, which Tidwell said were committed with "a very sharp instrument," occurred Sunday sometime between midnight and 2 a.m. One of the weapons was found, but Tidwell refused to describe it.

Investigators hoped Monday to find the slayer, Joshua Ryan, 8, who was rushed to Loma Linda University Medical Center with multiple stab wounds.
