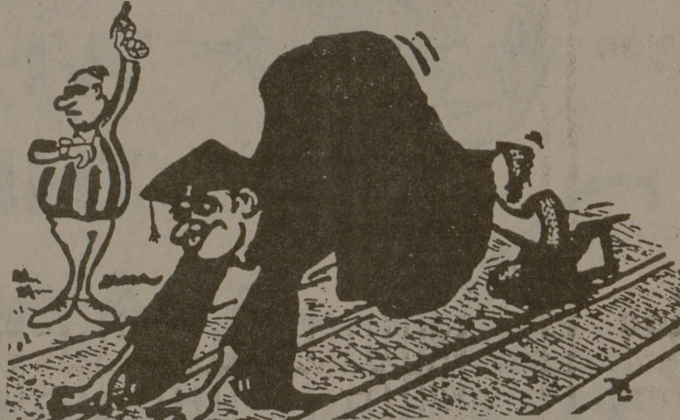

Conspiracy subject of suit

Braniff creditors batt

FORT WORTH — An undeclared skirmish among Braniff International's creditors Wednesday erupted into a major legal battle with Braniff's bondholders filing a \$100 million suit against the airline's secured lenders.

The class action suit accuses Braniff's institutional lenders of acquiring the power in a conspiracy "to donate, control and manipulate Braniff's financial affairs," beginning in late 1980. Named as defendants were almost 40 of the nation's largest banks and insurance companies who hold mortgages on Braniff's remaining jet fleet and related ground service equipment. The suit seeks payment of

some \$100 million of principal and the deferred interest and other costs that have been incurred since Braniff filed for bankruptcy and reorganization in May 1982.

The suit, by the Secured Bond Owners Creditors' Committee, also accuses three banks — Fidelity Union, Inferfirst Dallas and Chemical Bank — of failing to perform their duties to protect the interests of the bond holders.

The suit was filed by Boston attorney Edwin A. McCabe, who said the suit was not a response to recent reports that the secured lenders were close to an agreement with Hyatt of Chicago on a reorganization plan.

"I understand it is a committee's view of the arrangement with the lines discussed to date not be in the best interest of public debt owned and objected to in the bankruptcy courts," McCabe said.

"This suit has been brought because Braniff's lenders have been operating on the premise that the investing public is ignored. We intend to get them wrong."

Braniff's lenders, 2,000 bondholders and 40 banks and insurance companies. But the small banks and insurance companies are owed about three times amount of money claimed by bondholders.

Police beating alleged

DALLAS — Four friends of a dentist who says he was brutally beaten by policemen in the exclusive suburb of University Park, including the county sheriff, testified the dentist was bruised, cut and limping after his arrest.

Earle Paschall is pressing a civil rights lawsuit against three University Park policemen accused of beating him after his arrest Dec. 16, 1981.

Paschall said he, his daughter and his daughter's boyfriend were arrested for no apparent reason during the annual office Christmas party at his house.

The dentist testified he was struck twice on the back of the head while he was handcuffed in the driveway of his home. He said verbal and physical abuse continued at the University Park Police Department, where an officer choked him into unconsciousness.

After more beatings, Paschall said, he was dragged by his hair to a cell, where the officer pulled out a section of hair. The hair was admitted as evidence in the trial.

Dallas County Sheriff Don Byrd testified Tuesday he has known Paschall for 35 years and went to Paschall's home the day

after the arrest "to pay a visit."

Byrd said, "Some of the spots on him — and so forth — but I don't remember where they were."

Byrd said he later went to a hospital where the dentist spent a week in a beating.

"The bruises by then really began to show," Byrd said.

Former Dallas police officer Robert D. Studabaker testified Max Motley — Paschall's attorney — also described the dentist's injuries.

Students hijack buses to protest school's state

JUAREZ, Mexico — Protesting agricultural college students continued with their to-date futile protests of deteriorated conditions at the Hermanos Escobar Agricultural College by

hijacking 19 buses and a gasoline tank truck.

There were no arrests in Tuesday's incident — the latest in a year of protests by the students who want the school raised to university status.

The protest, in which there were no reports of violence, was mild compared with the blocking of international bridges, firebombings of rival student groups and confrontations with police that have occurred in the past year.

The students planned to drive the buses to Mexico's capital to meet with officers from the department of agriculture. The tanker truck, full of diesel fuel, is the property of PEMEX, the government's oil monopoly.

The school ran into financial

difficulties in the 1960s threatened to close its doors. A group of government and business leaders obtained a state and national grant to bring the campus to a rural area of the city and kept the school alive.

The students and teachers at the college are content with the private board of directors and the school, but are angry from mismanagement and deterioration in the quality of education.

Part of the aim of the protest has been to draw private association to the school. Students accuse the board of hiring unqualified teachers and providing cards to "phantom" teachers who never show up for
