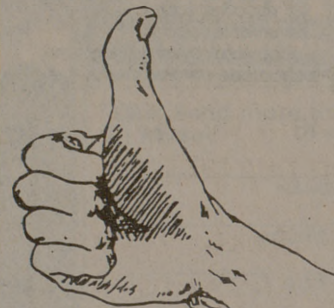

Official warns fires possible at nuclear site

FORT WORTH — Long electrical cables at the controversial Comanche Peak nuclear plant are so close to pipes that will carry heated steam or water that short circuits and fires may occur, a federal safety inspector warned.

Dan C. Ford, a consultant to the U.S. Nuclear Regulatory Commission, testified Tuesday that much of the wiring at the plant is now too close to other equipment or is in areas very difficult to reach.

He said an inadequate inspection program at the nuclear plant caused numerous electrical and pipe problems to remain undiscovered until early this year.

Ford said one of his largest concerns is that a number of metal trays containing cable are less than an inch from large pipes that will carry steam or hot water once the plant is operating.

He said heat from the pipes could melt the cable insulation, possibly causing short circuits that could lead to a fire. He said as many as 200 long electrical cables might have to be moved.

Ford told a U.S. Atomic Safety and Licensing Board that most of the electrical inspections at the plant, near Glen Rose,

have yet to be conducted — even though the first of the plant's two reactors is almost complete. The panel is conducting licensing hearings.

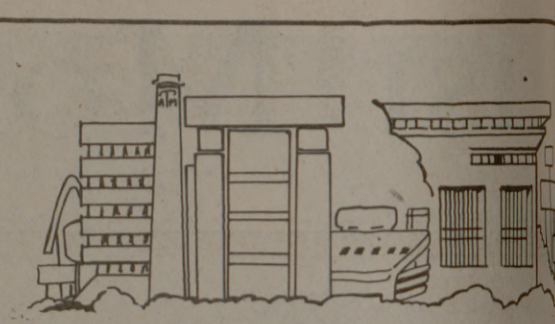
Ford said numerous problems uncovered in a major construction appraisal effort led inspectors to question whether similar flaws exist in areas they did not examine.

He questioned the plant operators' decision to wait until the end of construction to inspect electrical and pipe support work. Most other nuclear plants examine wire as it is installed, he said.

Another NRC inspector criticized plant officials for failing to detect installation problems through an internal audit.

William A. Hansen said plant audit teams had no employees with engineering background, performed too few audits and did not make sufficient effort to determine why work was not done properly. Quality control inspectors employed by the plant often did not report construction problems on the federally required forms, Hansen said.

Instead, he said, they dealt with them on an individual basis without identifying "the root cause and taking actions to prevent recurrence."

Geologists to hold symposium here

More than 300 geologists, geophysicists, and mining and civil engineers convene Sunday here for the four-day U.S. Symposium on Rock Mechanics.

The meeting includes one day of sessions sponsored by the American Society of Testing and Materials and another day of field trips to the Gibbons Creek lignite operation and to an oil well hydraulic fracturing job.

Remaining sessions deal with the subjects of analysis, construction, mining and laboratory findings.

This year's conference theme deals with the theoretical and practical aspects of rock mechanics. The meeting is sponsored by Texas A&M and the Association of Engineering Geologists in cooperation with the university's Center for Energy and Mineral Resources and the Office of Continuing Education, and by the U.S. National Committee for Rock Mechanics of the National Research Council.

Arms dealer gets probation

HOUSTON — Prosecutors asked a federal judge to give a prison term to an "international bagman" involved in an illegal arms deal with ex-CIA agent Edwin Wilson, but he and another arms dealer got probation.

Lawyer Edward J. Bloom, 75, of Pomona, Calif., was sentenced Tuesday to five years probation and was given travel restrictions for helping Wilson ship plastic explosives to Libya. Prosecutors had urged U.S. District Judge Ross Sterling to put Bloom in prison.

An undicted co-conspirator testified Bloom handled the financial arrangements for Wilson, who has been sentenced to 17 years in prison

for shipping 20 tons of the explosive RDX to Libyan terrorist Moammar Khadafy. Bloom was convicted May 20 of conspiracy to ship the explosives unlawfully, aiding in the submission of a false document to U.S. Customs, exporting a Defense Department-controlled article illegally and transporting a hazardous material.

Under terms of the probation order, he must serve 120 days in a California House and not leave the country. A second man involved in the deal, freight forwarder Thresher, 42, was sentenced to three years probation and change for a guilty plea.
