



good pitching. It's hard to believe trying to toss a ball past a guy with a club could be so difficult. But at the college level, where good hitters outnumber good pitchers by a bunch, throwing the ball well is a

Except in isolated cases, like the hardship lause in college basketball and the signing of Herschel Walker, he majority of the college coaching profession is immune to his problem.
