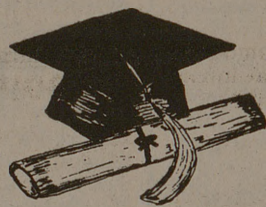

Water officials say El Paso not frugal

EL PASO — A Texas Department of Water Resources official said El Paso water officials are setting an example for the rest of the state in water conservation, but the city is still not doing enough.

The remarks came at the end of a hearing Tuesday to develop suggestions for the state water planning guide to be adopted by the Texas Water Development Board.

The El Paso hearing is one of several being held throughout the state to get input for the guide, called, "Water for Texas, Planning for the Future."
"El Paso will have to become more frugal" with the water resources available, said Dr. Herbert Grubb, director of planning for the State Water Resources Department, adding that the city-instituted water conservation programs are helpful.

El Paso, he said, has limited sources of water available, un-

like eastern parts of the state most conserve.

A University of Texas at El Paso scientist suggested storing water in northern Mexico reservoirs rather than the Elephant Butte Reservoir. Elephant Butte is located 120 miles north of El Paso.

Richard Marston, Geographical Sciences Department, also suggested that the allowed credit for pumping into the Rio Grande from storm water runoff. El Paso gets credit for adding to the river from treated effluent.

The amount of water goes into the river in an amount of allotment. Existing federal agreements said. El Paso draws from the river during summer months, purifying pumps it into the city supply.

Farmers may face fines for smuggling

DEL RIO — A north Texas couple, who federal officials say smuggled illegal aliens to work on their egg farm, face up to \$36,000 in fines if a plea bargain filed this week is approved.

A hearing was scheduled next Monday for Ernest "Sonny" Mahard and his wife, Helen, owners of the Mahard Egg Corp. in Prosper.

Assistant U.S. Attorney Dan Maeso of San Antonio said Tuesday the couple had signed an agreement to enter guilty pleas on all 10 counts filed against the corporation in exchange for having charges filed against them dropped.

A Del Rio grand jury handed down the 10-count indictment in June, charging the Mahards with transporting and conspiring to transport illegal aliens to their farm, located about 40 miles north of Dallas.

William Chambers of the Immigration and Naturalization Service office in Dallas said the Mahards allegedly paid from \$200 to \$350 per worker to have Mexican workers shipped to Prosper.

"Since January of this year,

we have arrested 175 alienizing death aliens on their premises," she said.

He said he did not know how many illegal workers had been funneled through what he called the Mahard "pipeline."

"All I can say is I have lived in Louisiana for 10 years and I have never seen a man like them," he said.

Chambers said the Mahards paid other people to bring Mexican workers north and deducted the cost from their wages.

"This is a normal probation-type situation," he said. "Last August the Florida picked up an alien who had worked on a farm north of Dallas. They kept him there because they were told they were low-average and they wouldn't let him go."

"We were satisfied with what the Mahards were doing," he said.

Maeso said his office requested the Occupational Safety and Health Administration investigate the Mahards' connection with the living conditions of these people.

Bill: Don't consider appointees' party

WASHINGTON — Two Democratic senators, one citing Missouri dioxin concerns, Tuesday introduced a bill to block administrations from considering political affiliation in appointing scientists to nonpartisan advisory boards.

Sen. Thomas Eagleton of Missouri and Dale Bumpers of Arkansas introduced the measure that also would prohibit political appointees from inquiring about the political affiliations of candidates to nonpartisan scientific advisory groups.

Eagleton said newspaper accounts indicate the administration has politicized "ostensibly non-partisan appointments" in the Environmental Protection Agency, Federal

Drug Administration, and the Department of Interior.

"Newspaper reports make it clear that this administration required — to an extent unprecedented by any previous administration — a litmus test of loyalty as a prerequisite for appointment of scientists."

Eagleton especially criticized EPA's naming of Dr. Matthew Meselson on a "hit list" of unacceptable scientists describing him as "poisonous to the public."

The bill would amend the Federal Advisory Commission Act "to prevent this kind of distortion of the selection process."

Mother fears missing son a murder victim

EL PASO — A Fort Bliss Marine captain and his wife who went backpacking in Idaho are dead, the victims of a bizarre wilderness group which murders people, the soldier's mother said.

Gilda Howard said Tuesday Capt. Robert Bravence, 28, and Cheryl, 26, failed to return from their trip to the Nez Perce National Forest by way of her Scottsdale, Ariz., home June 28 or 29.

Bravence has been missing from the base since he failed to report to work July 2.

"We have to be realistic," she said. "We know they're dead. We know what goes on out there. There are groups of people out there that are murdering people on the trails."

Bravence works in the Marine Corps Administrative Detachment at Fort Bliss, where he teaches soldiers how to fire the HAWK (Homing All-the-Way Killer) anti-aircraft missile.

Bravence's commanding officer, Col. William Speights, said Bravence has a lot of responsibility and "was doing a superb job."

Bravence, a native of Sher-

man, was a substitute teacher one of the El Paso schools last year. She was to begin the second grade full time fall. The couple has no children.

Officials say evidence indicates kidnapping and murder. On June 21, an area resident found the "Bravences' Volvo" camper at the Kamiah camp near Grangeville. There, no people in it, but the Siberian husky was in it.

Three days later the president went by the camp and found the dog tied to a tree with no vehicle.

On June 22, Bravence's mother found credit card used in Oregon. Police said it was used illegally, but gave no details.

On July 5, the VW was abandoned in a skid row of Los Angeles. It contained few camping articles, but personal items, Los Angeles officials reported. The vehicle not show bloodstains, damage or signs of foul play.

The FBI, National Forest Service and law enforcement agencies throughout the West are investigating the case, Howard said.
