Gulf Nuclear to face possible prosecution

HOUSTON — The Texas Radiation Advisory Board is calling for vigorous prosecution by the state against Gulf Nuclear Inc. for a Feb. 8 accident which exposed nine employees to radiation.

The accident and the company's initial failure to report it posed a direct threat to public health as well as the employees, said the board in a resolution

adopted last week The State Health Depart-ment did not learn of the acci-dent until six weeks after it occurred when one of the exposed workers reported it. That


