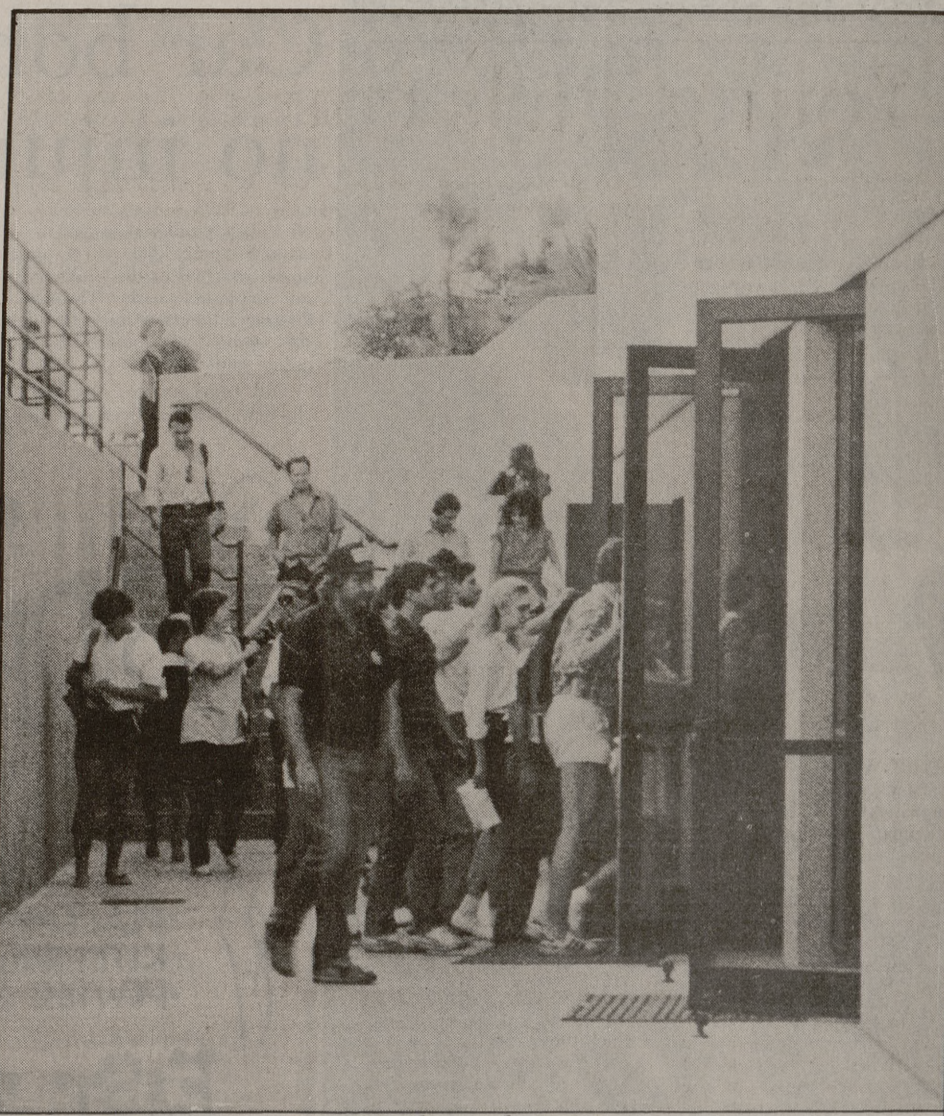

Police stop truck of illegal aliens going to Houston

United Press International KENDLETON — Police stopped two vehicles for speeding on U.S. 59 North and found a truck and car loaded with 33 illegal aliens headed for Houston, officials said Thursday.

Officers said Wednesday the 23 men, four women and six children complained they had not eaten in two or three days and many of the undocumented workers were in poor health. One of the men was very ill and had to be taken to a hospital.

Police said one of the drivers of

the vehicles — a pickup truck and a sedan — escaped. The driver of the car was a 15-year-old Mexican national.

The illegals, all from Mexico, were taken to the Fort Bend County jail and were to be transported to Immigration and Naturalization Service offices Thursday.

Fire destroys apartment units

United Press International SAN ANTONIO — A three-alarm fire that raged out of control for more than an hour destroyed about two-thirds of an uncompleted \$6 million apartment complex early Thursday officials said.

Firefighters responded to the blaze at about 10:30 p.m. Wednesday, but winds gusting up to 15 mph spread flames to nearby units and the fire was not brought under control until 12:11 a.m. The flames could be seen for about four miles.

Officials said the fire burned out of control for more than an

hour, damaging about two-thirds of the Deerfield Apartments — a \$6 million complex due for completion this fall.

Assistant Fire Chief Eugene Garza said five buildings with 10 units each were destroyed. The remaining units suffered smoke and water damage. Early estimates put the damage at about \$1 million.

At least 18 fire trucks and firefighters answered the call, officials said. No injuries were reported, but several firefighters were treated for exhaustion.

Officials said they suspect arson was the cause of the blaze.

UPI names Boatright as new V.P. and division manager

She succeeds Travis Hughes who will be named to a new executive marketing post with national responsibilities.

"Marge Boatright has worked in all facets of administration in the Southwest Division and she's both popular and a highly respected manager," Small said. "UPI has many women in senior jobs around the world, but we are particularly proud to see Marge Boatright become the first woman division manager."

Raised in Brady, Boatright earned a degree in business administration at the University of Texas and joined UPI in Dallas in 1961. She supervised the division's operations during most of the 1960s and was named business manager in 1969.

Boatright was promoted to marketing administrator in 1977 and became regional sales executive for North Texas in 1980, with both newspaper and broadcast sales and service responsibilities.

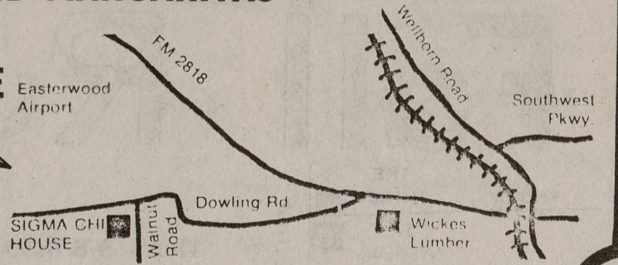
