Connors wins U.S. Open

United Press International NEW YORK — For all those who saw the match, there is little question about the difference between Jimmy Connors and Ivan Lendl.

It has nothing to do with Lendl's awesome forehand and serve, nor Connors' unpara-lleled service return. There is no way to pick it out of the multitude of other statistics that are now available.

The difference between the two amounts to mental toughness, a quality Connors has honed while winning eight Grand

Slam championships.

Mental toughness made the difference Sunday when Connors beat Lendl, 6-3, 6-7, 7-5, 6-0, to win the U.S. Open Championship for the fifth time. It was the second year in a row the American had conquered Lendl in the final.

The key to the match came in the third set when Lendl was serving at 5-4. On break point he double faulted, giving Connors
