

Sterilization is the most common choice among couples who have completed their families, the report said, noting that the 11.6 million sterilizations among such couples included 4.9 million vasectomies.

Concern over side effects of the pill and simplification of steriliza-tion operations helped make sterilization the most popular method.

pires in October 1985, gives Chrysler workers an immediate \$1 an hour pay increase, with addi-tional increases of \$1.42 by the end of the pact.
