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Texas officials question possible nuke waste site

United Press International LUBBOCK — Federal offi-cials have evaded answering questions from the High Plains Underground Water Conservation District No. 1 about proposed nuclear waste disposal sites, district spokes-men said.

Hereford and Tulia are Texas sites the federal gov-ernment is considering as possible waste disposal areas. Locations in other states also are being considered, water district officials said.

The conservation district sent copies of a letter outlining their complaints with the energy department to Presi-dent Reagan, congressional leaders and Texas officials.

"I sincerely believe that the DOE is not accurately re-

sponding to my questions," Conkwright said. "Our tech-nical people were appalled at some of DOE's responses."

Wayne Wyatt, conservation district manager, said Thurs-day district geologists have studied the federal energy officials' reponses to district questions

"We're disappointed that

they are just not being truth-ful," Wyatt said.

Among other issues, the geologists said test hole drill-ing around Hereford indicated moving underground water. They asked about possible leakage problems with water moving through salt beds in which the nuclear waste might be stored.

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United Press International WASHINGTON — Groundwater recharge projects may avert an impending water supply crisis that threatens economic havoc in the plains states and nationwide, witnesses told a Senate panel Thursday.

If we do nothing to reverse the trend of declining water tables, whole areas of the coun-try face drastically altereed con-ditions," said Rep. Doug Bereuter, R-Neb.

"The impact of inadequate water supplies upon agricultural production, industrial development and energy production will be staggering," he said.

Bereuter was one of several witnesses testifying in favor of a bill by Sen. Don Nickles, R-Okla., to require a study of the potential of groundwater recharge in the High Plains and western states.

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
