## Astros lose as Atlanta stays alive in the west

HOUSTON — The Atlanta Braves remained on the brink of elimination Thursday night but refused to give in, coming from three runs behind to defeat the Houston Astros, 5-4.

Randy Johnson drove in Chris Chambliss in the ninth inning, who singled off Vern Riffe, 8-5, with one out and moved to second on a ground-out. Gene Garber, 4-5, picked up the victory with ninth in-

ning relief help from Terry Forster.  
Atlanta, which has three games remaining, must win all its games and hope for Los Angeles to lose its remaining four games to even tie for the division title.  
The Dodgers were beaten, 7-1, in the first game of a double-header with San Diego Thursday night but could still win the division with a victory in the nightcap.  
Any Atlanta loss or Los Angeles victory will make the Dodgers champs of the National League's West Division. Reliever Terry Forster, who's wild pitch lost the game for Atlanta last night, picked up his 13th save in the contest.  
"It's down to one and we're going to keep it interesting," he said. "I'm glad we came back from three runs down. It shows what kind of character this team has. Let the Dodgers earn it."  
Manager Joe Torre agreed.

## Judge rules QB ineligible

NEW ORLEANS — A state district judge Thursday declared quarterback Jon English ineligible to play for Tulane this season, depriving the Green Wave of their starting passer and possibly subjecting Tulane to NCAA punishment.  
Civil District Judge Revis Ortique lifted a temporary restraining order that had permitted English to perform in each of the four Tulane games so far this fall, saying it was unlikely English would succeed in his case against the NCAA.  
English's attorney Gibson Tucker said he would appeal Friday to the 4th Circuit Court of Appeals and said "there's a chance English will play" Saturday night against Vanderbilt. The circuit court would have to overrule Ortique for English to perform in the Superdome clash.

English said when told of the decision. "I relied on the NCAA rules that said I would be eligible. I did everything I was supposed to do."  
The NCAA declared English ineligible because he did not sit out one year after his transfer from Iowa State to Tulane, where his father is head coach.  
English, who had argued he fulfilled the one-year requirement during an earlier transfer from Michigan State to Iowa State, had been allowed by Ortique to play in Tulane's four games this fall.

NCAA regulations, however, state a school can be penalized for using an ineligible player — even if he performs under a court order.  
Tulane could be forced to turn over \$340,000 in television revenues from a game against Kentucky and forfeit wins over Florida State and Mississippi. Such penalties would be determined at a later time by the NCAA.  
Tulane officials initially tried to convince the NCAA that English was eligible, but supported the NCAA once it had reached its final decision.  
Ortique dismissed Tucker's attempt to prove the NCAA was guilty of violating Louisiana's antitrust laws.

## Foreman donates belt, robe to library in honor of LBJ

AUSTIN — Former heavyweight boxing champion George Foreman presented his championship belt and red satin robe Thursday to the Lyndon B. Johnson Library in honor of the former president's Job Corps program, which Foreman created in 1973.  
Foreman, 34, now a preacher in Humble, Texas, said he wanted to give the belt and robe to the library because Johnson

— who Foreman described as "another great fighter" — was indirectly responsible for his boxing career.  
"I wore the robe with pride because it had been President Johnson's Job Corps which changed my direction in life," said Foreman, who won the heavyweight title from Joe Frazier in 1973.  
"This is why I love my country," he said. "A young man can come from nowhere and get a chance to be a part of the history of one of the greatest presidents of this country."  
Foreman was a troubled youth in Houston when he was given the choice of going to jail or joining the Job Corps, which LBJ had established to teach

young people marketable skills while allowing them to continue their educations.  
While Foreman was at a Job Corps center in Oregon, his tendency to pick fights prompted the center's director to suggest that he do his fighting in the boxing ring.  
Foreman went on to win a gold medal at the 1968 Olympics in Mexico City and won the heavyweight title five years later on Jan. 22, 1973 — ironically, the same day LBJ died.  
Mrs. Johnson said her late husband had been particularly proud of the Job Corps program and would have appreciated Foreman's gifts as examples of how the program affected the lives of young people.

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
