**Suspect farmer being hunted**

RUTHTON, Minn. — Authorities in six states Saturday intensified their search for a farmer and his son charged with gunning down two bank officials who reportedly blocked credit for the pair's farm operation.

"We have checked a lot of reported sightings of white pickup trucks but so far nothing," one officer said.

Felony arrest warrants were issued late Friday for James Jenkins, 46, and his son, Steve, 18, who were believed to have fled the vacant farm they once owned after the bankers were gunned down Thursday.

Jenkins' parents, Clayton and Nina Jenkins, made a tearful televised appeal to try to convince the two to give themselves up.

"They should give themselves up before anybody else gets hurt," the elder Jenkins said. "They've done about all the damage they can do."

"Steve — We want you to give yourself up and come home," Mrs. Jenkins pleaded. "Please come home."

Officials believe Jenkins, unhappy that the Buffalo Ridge Bank foreclosed on his farm and was blocking credit for another farm, lured Rudy Blythe, 42, president of bank in Ruthton, and "Toby" Thulin, 37, a loan officer, to the farm by pretending they were prospective buyers.

The manhunt centered in southwestern Minnesota. Deputies were keeping a close eye on several farms in the area and were patrolling back-country roads, Lincoln County Sheriff Abe Thompson said. There were no leads.

An all-points bulletin for the fugitives covered North and South Dakota, Wisconsin, Missouri and Iowa.

The Jenkins were said to be armed with a sawed-off shotgun, .30-caliber rifle, handgun and small grenades. They stopped at a gun shop to buy 100 rounds of high-powered rifle ammunition.

Jenkins had been plagued by money problems for many years, losing equipment, livestock and finally the 10-acre farm when he couldn't pay off loans.

Jim Langman, a farmer and president of the Minnesota chapter of the American Agriculture Movement, said he understood the problems faced by Jenkins.

"A farmer is a human being and a human being is an animal," he said. "If you beat at him, poke at him and take everything away from him, he's going to turn and bite back."

Langman called the slayings "unfortunate," but said they were "symbolic and should send a message to the nation that lenders have to work things out on a long-term basis."

**Services held for legislator**

SAN ANTONIO — Services will be held Tuesday morning for Rep. Matt Garcia, one of the Texas Legislature's most ardent supporters of teacher pay raises and other public education improvements, who died Saturday evening of a heart attack.

Garcia, 55, was a six-term Democratic legislator who served on the House Appropriations Committee and was best known for his efforts to improve Texas public school education.

In 1981, Garcia co-sponsored with State Senator Carlos Truan the 1981 bilingual education reform law forcing schools to offer Hispanic students instruction in Spanish. Garcia also was one of the legislative leaders who consistently pushed for increases in teachers' pay in order to improve the quality of education in the state.

A champion of civil rights and voter registration, Garcia helped lead redistricting measures during the 1981 legislative session. He chaired the Mexican American Legislative Caucus this year which sponsored legislation creating the new Human Rights Commission.

Garcia, a graduate of St. Mary's University Law School, turned down two state judicial appointments offered by Gov. Dolph Briscoe, choosing instead to remain in the Texas House.

Gov. Mark White and other state politicians have said they plan to attend the funeral Tuesday at the San Fernando Cathedral in San Antonio.

"He will be remembered in the years to come for his tenacious leadership on behalf of bilingual education and civil rights," White said Sunday in a statement. "During the past decade he has authored, co-sponsored, and pushed through more important legislation than anyone else."

Administrative assistant Orlando Garcia said the San Antonio legislator suffered a heart attack Saturday and was rushed to Baptist Memorial Hospital. He died shortly after midnight Saturday. Garcia is survived by his wife, Minnie, and four children.

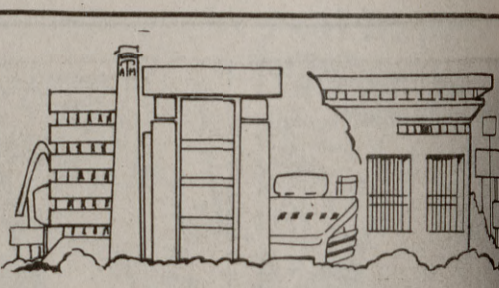

**Insolvent bank to open again**

ODESSA — The National Bank of Odessa — rendered insolvent by bad energy loans — will reopen Monday with a new name and owner, Federal Deposit Insurance Corporation officials said.

The bank, closed Friday by federal authorities because of bad energy loans, was immediately acquired by a subsidiary of Independent Bankshares, Inc. of Abilene. It will reopen as the First State Bank of Odessa.

FDIC spokesman Alan Whitney said the assumption of deposits by the new bank prevented a liquidation of the failed bank's accounts. The move also protected depositors with accounts above the federally-insured limit of \$100,000, he said.

Depositors of the failed bank will automatically become depositors of First State Bank of Odessa with the FDIC transaction, Whitney said. The bank will advance \$46.9 million in cash to the new bank and retain control over assets about \$62 million, he said.

Carla Brooks, of the Federal Reserve Bank of Dallas, said the Reserve Bank shares in the assumption of the liabilities of the national Bank of Odessa emergency provisions Bank Holding Company. The failed bank had assets of \$77 million and about \$27 million in deposits.

Federal banking officials sought court approval of the deposit assumption Friday, immediately after Acting Comptroller of the Currency Selby closed the bank.

"Over the past six months the bank suffered increasing heavy losses on energy loans," Selby said. "These losses finally exhausted the bank's capital funds and reserves, rendering it insolvent."
